

# PROCEEDINGS

of the

FORTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION OF OLD REGULAR BAPTIST THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST

In Session Assembled with Turkey Creek Church, September 8, 9, 10, 1939.

At the place where arrangements were made for the preaching, the services were introduced by Elder Jonah Bevins, followed by the introductory sermon delivered by Elder Asa Evans. Text: Mathew, 7th Chapter, 14th Verse—"Strait is the gate, narrow is the way which leadeth unto life and few there be that find it".

Then the delegates assembled at the church house and after a short talk and song and prayer by Elder F. A. Hopkins, the association proceeded a sfollows:

- 1. Called for the letters from the several churches and received the letters and seated the delegates.
- 2. The association then organized by electing Elder Hi Maynard as Moderator; Elder Ester Hopkins, Assistant Moderator; Elder Jonah Bevins, Clerk; and Brother R. L. Murphy, Assistant Clerk.
- 3. At the request of the Moderator, the Rules of Decorum were read by the Clerk.
- 4. Called for newly organized churches and received one church, which church was Little Vine.
- 5. Called for letters from sister associations nd received as follows: New Salem, by the hands of Elders Hays Maynard and F. A. Hopkins, and Brother Billie Moore. Letter in the hands of Elder F. A. Hopkins.

Kyova by the hands of Elders C. Cole, R. A. Damron, Earl Clay, G. W. Thornhill, C. M. Childers and Brother J. H. Pack. Letter in the hands of Elder C. Cole.

Philadelphia by the hands of Elders Finess Adkins and Brother Fred Akers. Letter in the hands of Elder Finess Adkins.

Union by the hands of Elders H. M. Mullins, H. C. Maynard, M. V. Burk, Brothers W. S. Mullins, Johnnie Wright. Letter in the hands of Brother W. S. Mullins.

Mud River by the hands of Elders Leonard Oxley, John Miller, Brother C. Hill. Letter in the hands of Elder Leonard Oxley.

- 6. Called for transient ministers and members of our faith and order, the following received: J. R. Evans, Willard Blair, George Clay, Willis Blackburn, M. P. Burk, Asa Evans and Burl Maynard.
  - 7. Ordered that the Moderator make all temporary appointments.
- Committee appointed to take care of the visiting brethren as follows: Elder Ester Hopkins, Brothers Ken Varney and Troy Francis.
- 9. Committee appointed to see that the stand be supplied with ministers and that peace be preserved around the stand: Elder Lark Lowe, Brothers Louis Marcum and Floyd Runyon.
- 10. Committee to arrange the ministry for Saturday consisting of one member from each church with the entire delegation of the Turkey Creek Church. Ministers as follows: First, Elder Henry C. Maynard; Second, Elder Leonard Oxley; Third, Elder G. W. Thornhill; Fourth, Elder F. A. Hopkins.
  - 11. Appointed clerks to write letters to corresponding associations.
- 12. Committee on arrangements consisting of one delegate from each church with the moderator and clerks with the corresponding associations invited.
- 13. On motion by Elder Jonah Bevins, the Association adjourned until 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning.

## SATURDAY MORNING

Met pursuant to adjournment and after song, services were introduced by Elder Hayes Maynard, and prayer by Elder Ester Hopkins.

- 1. Called the roll and marked the absentees.
- 2. Read the Bill of Arrangements and discharged the committee on same.
- 3. Appointed a committee on finance consisting of: Elder Ester Hopkins, Brother Troy Francis and Elder J. G. Thurnsbury. who reported the contributions from each church as shown in the statistical table.

- 5. Ordered that Elder Willis Blackburn be retained as Treasurer.
- 6. That the clerk superintend the printing of the minutes and that he have 2000 copies printed and that he be allowed \$15.00 for his services for preparing manuscript and recording the same.
- 7. Brethren called in union meetings and Associations last year made their reports. Their reports received, failures excused. They were all admonished to be more faithful this coming year.
- 8. Appointed same committee to arrange for preaching Sunday who reported as follows: First, Ruben Dyer; Second, Elder John Miller; Third, Finess Adkins; Fourth, Hi Maynard; Saturday night at the School House, Elders Blaine England and Ruben Dyer.
- 9. Letters to sister associations read and appointed delegates as follows: New Salem to be held with the Enterprise Church to begin on Friday before the fourth Saturday in September, 1939. Elders Ester Hopkins, Hi Maynard, Willis Blackburn and Brother R. L. Murphy. Letter in the hands of Elder Ester Hopkins.

Kyova to be held with the New Mount Olivet Church to begin on Friday before the first Sunday in September, 1940. Elders Ester Hopkins, W. A. Hurley, W. C. Hay, Jonah Bevins and Brothers Burl Maynard and R. L. Murphy. Letter in the hands of Elder Ester Hopkins.

Philadelphia to be held with the Mount Olivet Church to begin on Friday before the third Saturday in September, 1939. Elders Willis Blackburn, W. A. Hurley, Ernest Runyon, Jonah Bevins and Brother B. F. Maynard. Letter in the hands of Elder Jonah Bevins.

- 11. Ordered, that we print obituaries presented to the Brother Clerk at the close of the association.
- 12. Ordered, that the treasurer pay the expense of one car for visiting sister associations, paying for the oil and gas.
- 13. Ordered, that we advise ministers of our association not to marry people into adultery where either man or woman has a living wife or husband.
- 14. Shall we receive into our fellowship men having more than one wife or women having more than one husband?

ANSWER: We advise the churches not to receive into their fellowship any such except those who have put away the companions for the cause of fornication and such cases to have the Gospel or church evidence of same.

- 15. We, the Sardis Association, do hereby advise the churches of our union to use discretion in setting apart men for the ministry as we believe that if a man is called to the ministry by the spirit of God the same spirit will fully manifest its work to the church to which this man belongs nd will prompt such church to liberate the man; again we do advise the churches not to ordain any man to the ministry when such party make demand for such action, and further advise the churches that they be sure that a man has the gift of preaching or exhortation before they lay hands on same. And after he has been liberted and set forth by the church to preach the Gospel and fails to exercise his gift we advise the church to which he belongs to deal with him and, if necessary, demand his credentials.
- 16. Ordered, that our next association to be held with Sardis Church, Delbarton, Mingo County, West Virginia, to begin on Friday before the second Sturday in September, 1940.
- 17. By vote, it is ordered that Elder Ester Hopkins preach the introductory sermon and that Elder Jonah Bevins be his alternate.
- 18. Ordered, that we tender our thanks to the Turkey Creek Church and to the community at large.
- 19. Ordered, that the minutes be read and signed by the Moderator and Clerk.

The association then adjourned to the time and place mentioned above.

## September 10, 1939

The services were introduced by Elder Ruben Dyer of the Kyova Association; second on the stand was Elder John Milley, Moderator, Mud River Association; Text: Psalms, 127th chapter, 1st verse: "Except the Lord build the house they labor in vain that build it; except the Lord keep the city a watchman waketh in vain". He was followed by Elder Finis Adkins, Moderator, Philadelphia Association who came to the stand using for his subject Matthew, 28th chapter, 19-20th verses: "Go ye therefore and teach all nations baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you and lo! I am with you alway even unto the end of the world".

Elder Hi Maynard, our beloved Moderator, closed the service, using for a text the language of the Apostle Paul to the Corinthian Brethren—13th chapter 11th verse: "Finally, brethren, farewell. ## CONSTITUTION

From a long series of experiences, we, the churches uf Jesos Christ being regularly baptized upon our profession of faith in Jesus Christ are convinced of the necessity of combination of churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and preserve, maintain and keep the rules and orders of an Association according to the following form of government:

Article 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches and duly sent to represent in this Association who shall be members who they shall think best qualified for the purpose and producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment shall be entitled to seats.

Article 2. In the letters from the different churches, shall be expressed their number in full fellowship, their baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since the last Association.

Article 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage nor shall they infringe on the internal rights of any church in the union.

Article 4. The Association when convened shall be governed and ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

Article 5. The Association shall have a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

Article 6. New churches may be admitted into our union that shall petition by letter and delegate, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly shall be received by the Association and manifested by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

Article 7. Every church in the Union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.

Article 8. Every query presented by any church to the Association, being first debated by their own church shall be taken up by the Association.

Article 9. Every motion made and seconded shall be taken up by the Association except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.

Article 10. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of the Association.

Article 11. The church shall send money by the delegates of each church for printing the minutes of the Association.

Article 12. There shall be a record book kept wherein the proceedings of every Association shall be regularly recorded by the Secretary appointed for that purpose.

Article 13. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Modertor and Clerk before the Association rises.

Article 14. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made at any time, by a majority of the Union, when they deem necessary.

Article 15. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by the will of the majority.

Article 16. The Association shall have power: 1. To provide for the general union of the churches. 2. To preserve inviolably a chain of communication among the churches. 3. To give the churches all neessary advice in matters of difficulty. 4. To inquire into the cause when the churches fail at any time to represent themselves at the Association. 5. To appoint any member by and with their consent to transact any business which they think necessary. 6. The Association shall have power to withdraw from any church in this union which shall violate the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion. 7. To admit any orderly minister of our order to a seat with us in the Association. 8. The Association shall have power to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the churches of the union. 9. That no minister shall be ordained unless forwarded by the church and it shall require two or more ordained ministers to compose a presbytery for that purpose.

#### ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article 1. We, the churches of Jesus Christ, called Regular Baptist, are constituted on the following faith. viz:

Article 2. We believe in only one true and living God, the Creator of heaven and earth and all things that are therein contained.

Article 3. We believe in Jesus Christ, the eternal Son of God, who is head and king of His church.

Article 4. We believe in the Holy Ghost, the sealer and applier of the redemption purchased by Christ.

Article 5. We believe in the Father, Son and Holy Ghost and these three are one.

Article 6. We believe in the Old and New Testament Scriptures to be the infallible word of God and take it for our only rule of faith and practice and nothing is to be taken from or added to it.

Article 7. We believe in the free atonement of Jesus Christ that He tasted death for every man and that salvation is to all men and women on the terms of the gospel.

Article 8. We believe that repentance and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and regeneration are necessary previous to baptism, and that immersion is the only right way of administering the ordinance.

Article 9. We believe that Christ has but one true gospel church and that it will finally persevere through grace to glory.

Article 10. We believe in the communion of the Lord's Supper, that is, taking of the bread and wine by the church of Jesus Christ in commemoration of the death and suffering of the Son of God until His second coming.

Article 11. We believe that feet washing is an example of Jesus Christ, and ought to be observed and kept up by His Church until His second coming.

Article 12. We believe that Jesus Christ is the first resurrection from the dead and that He lives forever.

Article 13. We believe in the resurrection of the just and unjust.

Article 14. We believe the happiness of the saints and the punishment of the wicked are eternal.

## RULES OF DECORUM

Article 1. The Association to be opened and closed by prayer.

Article 2. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

Article 3. Only one member shall speak at a time and he shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator when he is about to make a speech.

Article 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech except by the Moderator, till he is done speaking and shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on the person who spoke before or make remarks on mishaps, failures or imperfections, but shall verily state that cause and matter as nearly as he can so as to convey his light and idea.

Article 5. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on one subject without consent of the Association.

Article 6. No person shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the Association without liberty obtained from it.

Article 7. No member of the Association shall have the liberty of laughing during the sittings nor whisperings in time of public speech.

Article 8. No member of this Association shall address another by any other term or appelation other than that of Brother.

Article 9. The Moderator shall not interrupt a member or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light upon the subject except when he breaks the rules of decorum.

Article 10. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called over as often as the Moderator requires.

Article 11. The Moderator shall have the same privilege of speech as another member provided the chair be filled, but shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided.

Article 12. Any member who shall wilfully and knowingly break any of the rules shall be reproved by the Association as it may think proper.

Article 13. The delegation to be seated in this Association shall be limited to three members from each church.

Article 14. No person shall speak more than five minutes at the same time without liberty obtained from the Association.
