PROCEEDINGS

of the

FIFTIETH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION OF OLD REGULAR BAPTIST THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST

In session assembled with the Salem Church, September 11, 12 and 13, 1942, at the Salem Church House where arrangements were made for the preaching; the services were introduced by Elder Grover Carey, followed by the introductory sermon delivered by Elder Ester Hopkins, text: Hebrews, 13 chapter and the first verse, which reads as follows: Let Brotherly Love Continue.

Then the delegates assembled at the church house and after a short talk and song and prayer by Elder W. A. Hurley, the association proceeded as follows:

- Called for the letters from the several churches and received the letters and seated the delegates.
- 2. The association then organized by electing Elder Hi Maynard as moderator, Elder Ester Hopkins as assistant moderator, Elder Jonah Bevins as clerk and Brother Troy T. Francis as assistant clerk.
- 3. At the request of the moderator the rules of decorum were read by the clerk.
 - 4. Called for newly organized churches and received none.
- 5. Called for letters from sister associations and received as follows: New Salem, by the hands of Elders C. F. Conn, Billy Moore and Squire Hamilton. Letter in the hands of Elder C. F. Conn. Philadelphia, by the hands of Elders Finis Adkins, W. H. Gilliam, Ira Adkins and M. W. Burnette. Letter in the hands of Elder M. W. Burnette. Union, by the hands of Elders B. H. Baker, Rufus Parigan, J. B. May, H. C. Maynard and George Parigan. Letter in the hands of Elder H. C. Maynard. Mud River, by the

hands of Elders Gilbert Miller, J. W. Miller, Wetzel Ball and Hillard Pauley. Letter in the hands of Elder J. W. Miller.

- 6. Called for transient ministers and members of our faith and order, the following received: Hays Maynard, W. A. Hurley, Bennett Adams, Basil Robinette, Willie White, W. C. Hay and Asa Evans.
- Ordered that the moderator make all temporary appointments.
- Committee appointed to take care of the visiting brethren as follows: Kelly Stanley, Mat Varney, Clyde Bevins, Okie Bevins, Jimmie Blackburn and Ester Hopkins.
- 9. Committee appointed to see that the stand be supplied with ministers and that peace is preserved around the stand: Sheriff Ben Maynard and Brother Jimmie Blackburn.
- 10. Committee to arrange the ministry for Saturday, consisting of one member from each church with the entire delegation of the Salem Church. Ministers as follows: First, Elder Gilbert Miller; Second, Elder G. M. Parigan; Third, Elder Hays Maynard, and Fourth, Elder Finis Adkins.
- 11. Friday night services, Elders Ester Hopkins, J. W. Miller and B. H. Baker.
- Appointed clerks to write letters to corresponding associations,
- 13. Committee on arrangements consisting of one delegate from each church with the moderators and clerks with the corresponding associations invited.
- 14. On motion by Elder E. S. Coleman the association adjourned until 9:00 o'clock Saturday morning.

SATURDAY MORNING

Met pursuant to adjournment and after song and prayer, service introduced by Elder Finis Adkins.

- 1. Called the roll and marked the absentees.
- 2. Read the bill of arrangements and discharged the committee on same.
- 3. Appointed a committee on finance consisting of Elders Willis Blackburn, Ester Hopkins and Wallace Maynard, who reported the contributions from each church as shown in the statistical table.
 - 4. Called on the treasurer to report, who reported as follows:

- 5. Ordered that Elder Willis Blackburn be retained as treasurer.
- 6. That the clerk superintend the printing of the minutes and that we have two thousand (2,000) copies printed and that he be allowed \$15.00 for his services for preparing manuscript and recording the same.
- 7. Brethren called in union meeting and associations last year made their reports. Their reports received, failures excused. They were all admonished to be more faithful this coming year.
- 8. Appointed same committee to arrange for preaching Sunday, who reported as follows: First, Elder H. C. Maynard; Second,

Elder Finis Adkins; Third, Elder B. H. Baker, with moderator closing. Saturday night service: J. B. May, H. W. Gilliam and W. A. Hurley.

9. Letters to Sister Associations read and appointed delegates as follows:

New Salem, to be held with the New Salem church to begin on Friday before the fourth Saturday in September, 1942.

- 12. Order that we advise ministers of our Association not to marry people into adultery where either man or woman has a living wife or husband.
- 13. Shall we receive into our fellowship men having more than one wife or women having more than one husband? Answer:

We advise the churches not to receive into their fellowship any such, except those who have put away their companions for the cause of fornication, and such cases to have the Gospel or church evidence of same.

- 14. By motion it was ordered that each delegate of the several churches ascertain whether or not they accept the Articles of Faith of the Apple Orchard Church carried in our minutes last year, as the uniform faith of each church and report at our next Association,
- 15. By motion it was ordered that we reject the letter presented to us from the New Sulphur Springs association asking correspondence with us.

- 16. By motion it was ordered that we, the Association, pay off the indebtedness held against the Enon church house of the Sardis Association.
- 17. By motion it was ordered that each delegate from the several churches ascertain whether or not their church is in favor of erecting one church building each year, for the several churches which have no buildings, and report the same at our next Association.
- 18. Ordered that our next Association be held with the Bent Branch Church, Pike County, Kentucky, about half way the distance between Williamson, West Virginia, and Pikeville, Kentucky, on state highway route 119, to begin on Friday before the second Saturday in September, 1943.
- 19. By vote it was ordered that Elder Grover Carey preach the introductory sermon, and Elder W. C. Hay be his alternate.
- 20. Ordered that we tender our thanks to the Salem Church and the community at large.
- 21. Ordered that the minutes be read and signed by the Moderator and Clerk. The Association then adjourn to the time and place mentioned above. Elder Hi Maynard, Moderator,

Elder Ester Hopkins, Asst. Moderator, Elder Jonah Bevins, Clerk, Brother Troy T. Francis, Asst. Clerk.

SUNDAY MORNING SERVICE

R. L. Murphy

This was a real brother in Christ, and I feel my inability to write of the wonderful life which he possessed. This precious brother was the son of the late John and Peggy Murphy. 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From a long series of experiences, we, the churches of Jesus Christ being regularly baptized upon our profession of faith in churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and preserve, maintain and keep the rules and orders of an asso-

ciation according to the following form of government:

ARTICLE I. The association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches and duly sent to represent them in this association who shall be members whom they shall think best qualified for the purpose. And, producing letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to seats.

ARTICLE II. In the letters from the different churches, shall be expressed their number in full fellowship, their baptized, received by letters, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since the last association.

ARTICLE III. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor shall they infringe upon the internal rights of any church in the union.

ARTICLE IV. The association, when convened, shall be governed and ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

ARTICLE V. The association shall have a moderator, clerk and treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

ARTICLE VI. New churches may be admitted into our union that shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly shall be received by the association and manifested by the moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE VII. Every church in the union shall be entitled to a representation in the association.

ARTICLE VIII. Every query presented by any church to the association being first debated by their own church, shall be taken up by the association.

ARTICLE IX. Every motion made and seconded shall be taken up by the association, except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.

ARTICLE X. The association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with the minutes of the association.

ARTICLE XI. The churches shall send money by the delegates of each church for printing the minutes of the association.

ARTICLE XII. There shall be a record book kept wherein the proceeding of every association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary appointed for that purpose.

ARTICLE XIII. The minutes of the association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the moderator and clerk before the association rises.

ARTICLE XIV. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made at any time, by a majority of the union, when they deem necessary.

ARTICLE XV. All matters coming before the association shall be decided by the will of the majority.

ARTICLE XVI. The association shall have power:

- 1. To provide for the general union of the churches.
- 2. To preserve inviolably a chain of communication among the churches.
- To give the churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty.
- To inquire into the cause when the churches fail at any time to represent themselves in the association.
- 5. To appoint any member by and with their consent to transact any business which they think necessary.
- The association shall have power to withdraw from any church in this union which shall violate the rules of the association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion.
- 7. To admit any orderly minister of our order to a seat with us in the association.

8. The association shall have power to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the churches of the union. That no minister shall be ordained unless forwarded by the church, and it shall require two or more ordained ministers to compose a presbytery, for that purpose. 8. The association shall have power to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the churches of the union. ARTICLES OF FAITH

We, the churches of Jesus Christ, called Regular Baptist, are constituted on the following faith, viz:

ARTICLE I. We believe in only one true and living God, the creator of heaven and earth and all things that are therein contained.

ARTICLE II. We believe in Jesus Christ, the eternal Son of God, who is head and King of His church.

ARTICLE III. We believe in the Holy Ghost, the sealer and applier of the redemption purchased by Christ.

ARTICLE IV. We believe in the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and these three are one.

ARTICLE V. We blieve the Old and New Testament Scriptures to be the infallible word of God and take it for our only rule of faith and practice and nothing is to be taken from or added to it.

ARTICLE VI. We believe in the free atonement of Jesus Christ; that He tasted death for every man, and that salvation is to all men and women on the terms of the Gospel.

ARTICLE VII. We believe that repentance and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and regeneration are necessary previous to baptism, and that immersion is the only right way of administering the ordinance.

ARTICLE VIII. We believe that Christ has but one true Gospel church, and that it will finally persevere through grace to glory.

ARTICLE IX. We believe in the communion of the Lord's Supper; that is, taking of the bread and wine by the church of Jesus Christ in commemoration of the death and suffering of the Son of God until His second coming.

ARTICLE X. We believe that feet washing is an example of Jesus Christ, and ought to be observed and kept up by His church until His second coming.

ARTICLE XI. We believe that Jesus Christ is the first resurrection from the dead, and that He lives forever.

ARTICLE XII. We believe in the resurrection of the just and unjust.

ARTICLE XIII. We believe the happiness of the Saints and the punishment of the wicked are eternal.

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RULES OF DECORUM

ARTICLE I. The association to be opened and closed by prayer.

ARTICLE II. The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

ARTICLE III. Only one member shall speak at a time and he shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator when he is about to make a speech.

ARTICLE IV. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech, except by the Moderator, until he is done speaking and shall strictly adhere to the subject, and, in no wise reflect upon the person who spoke before, nor make remarks or mishaps, failures or imperfections, but shall verily state the cause and matter as nearly as he can, so as to convey his light and idea.

ARTICLE V. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on one subject without consent of the association.

ARTICLE VI. No person shall abruptly break off or absent himself from the association without liberty obtained therefrom.

ARTICLE VII. No member of the association shall have the liberty of laughing during the sittings nor whispering in the time of public speech.

ARTICLE VIII. No member of this association shall address another by any other term or appelation other than that of brother.

ARTICLE IX. The Moderator shall not interrupt a member nor prohibit him from speaking until he gives his light upon the subject, except when he breaks the rules of decorum.

ARTICLE X. The names of several members of the association shall be enrolled by the clerk and called over so often as the Moderator requires.

ARTICLE XI. The Moderator shall have the same privilege of speech as another member; provided the chair be filled. But shall have no vote unless the association be equally divided.

ARTICLE XII. Any member who shall wilfully and knowingly break any other rules shall be reproved by the association as it may think proper.

ARTICLE XIII. The delegation to be seated in this association shall be limited to three members from each church.

ARTICLE XIV. No person shall speak more than five (5) minutes at the same time without liberty obtained from the association.

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ARTICLE IV. The flerout that speaking shall flow be interestanted in his speech, except by the Moderator, build be by dank

cupred in his speecy, except by the Modernton, wittl he by damiages, inc. and shall strictly efflore to the subject, and, in no wise serbed upon the person who spake perory, nor make reductly of beinging, failures on importactions, but shall verify state the cause did matter as acarly awdie can, so us to convey his light and item.
