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PROCEEDINGS OF THE EIGHTY-SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION OF OLD REGULAR BAPTIST THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST

FRIDAY September 8, 1978

The Sardis Association of Old Regular Baptist, the Church of Jesus Christ, assembled with the Bent Branch Church, Meta, Pike County, Kentucky on Friday before the second Saturday in September 1978.

Our Moderator, Elder Edwin May, came to the Stand welcoming the large congregation and advising that if the Sardis Association does not have peace it will not be God's fault because we reap just what we sow. If we have sowed discord we will reap discord but if we have sowed the seed of peace we will reap peace and this Association will show us just what we have sowed. We have so much that needs to be done and such a very short time to do it in; life is swiftly passing by and we must use the precious time we have to sow all the peace and love we possibly can. Brother Ed was thankful that the family had been allowed to come together once more on earth and prayed that God would be our chief Moderator and that His will would be done in all things.

Elder John P. Church opened the services about the hour of 9:30 a.m. stating that after having seen many friends and Brethren here today he couldn't help but remember the many that had already crossed over Jordon and will not attend our Association anymore. We are truly passengers on a swift journey who soon fade out of life's picture. Brother John took only a short time to bring up the services and point to Jesus to be the way to Heaven and eternal life. He hoped that Jesus would be our chief Moderator and that Zion would bend down low in our behalf during the Association. Brother John then led in prayer.

Elder James Gannon came forward to preach the Introductory Sermon. He did not use a specific Text but hoped that all of God's children had been praying for this Association and if they had not they should be ashamed because prayer is the key that opens the windows of Heaven for us. Brother James preached the "inward man" to be the man born again by the divine power of God and the man who receives the seal of God and can not sin. But the "outward man" to be a bound man, bound by the stronger "inward man", but still the man subject to mistake until the redemption of the body.

Brother James preached one Lord, one faith and one baptism and there

must, therefore, be only one Church. God adds to His Church daily such as should be saved. The timber that is added to the Church is made ready in the field and is the tall "trees" not the little "bushes". This Church is a clean Church and God adds only that which is clean, that which has been born again of the Spirit, and that which should be saved. If a member's name has not been added to the Lamb's Book of Life we can't put it there by adding their name to the Church Book here on earth. Brother James stated that God will not dwell in any unclean thing and it is high time we were more careful than we have ever been. We don't have time to mix and mingle with other Churches and to do so is to commit spiritual fornication. Any member who does not agree with Old Regular Baptist doctrine should get out because we stand on the old principals as laid down in the Scriptures. A member can't enter into the Church today and go out tomorrow — God does a whole work when He works and if we are a branch in that "true vine" we will bear the fruit of that "time".

Brother James stated he believed in a clean Church and that God's Church is clean. There is only one Church, the true Bride, a city set on a hill that can't be hid. If you are a stick in the Church today, God added you and you won't be ashamed of Her. Go, if you are ashamed of Her, get out! Brother James stated he believed the name "Baptist" came down from Heaven and that be believed in the old time Regular Baptist way. He stated there were too many who wanted to wear the name of Old Regular Baptist but wanted to wear their own apparel and not the old time Baptist apparel.

The Sardis Association delegates and a large delegation from our corresponding Sister Associations then assembled at the Bent Branch Church House where arrangements had been made for the work of the Sardis Association. As is our custom, the several Brethren, Sisters and friends remained at the tent where preaching of good tidings and great joy echoed up and down the valley proclaiming Jesus to be the life and the way to eternal peace and happiness.

Elder Baxter Osborne of the Northern New Salem Association introduced the services at the House, using only a little time but patiently and clearly admonishing the Brethren to be careful in their deliberations and to look to Jesus for guidance.

Elder Ivan Amburgey of the Indian Bottom Association led in prayer.

We then proceeded as follows:

- (1) Elder Edwin May, our dearly loved and humble Moderator, sought out the Officers of our Sister Associations and seated them on the Stand as our way of showing honor to our beloved Correspondence. Then he wisely admonished the Sardis delegates to take heed unto themselves and look to Jesus to be our chief Moderator during this Association. Let us engage in prayerful deliberation striving to do God's will in all things.
- (2) The Moderator appointed a Committee on Finance to receive the contributions sent to the Association by the several Churches as follows:

- (3) The Moderator called for the Letters from the Sardis Association Churches to be handed in to the Clerk and for the contributions to be handed in to the Committee on Finance.
- (4) The Letter from the Bent Branch Church was read by the Clerk and, upon motion and second, all Letters were received, the delegates seated and all Queries and Requests were referred to the Committee on Arrangements.
- (5) The Committee on Finance reported \$1,650.00 received from the Churches as reported in the Statistical Table and, after turning this amount over to the Treasurer, was discharged.
- (6) The Moderator appointed a Committee to take the vote of the Sardis Association delegates, who voted for a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk, as follows:

- (8) By motion and second, it is ordered that the Moderator make all temporary appointments during the setting of the Association.

- (10) By motion and second, the reading of the Constitution and Rules of Decorum was omitted.

- (16) On motion from Brother Alvin Thornsbury and second by Brother Stewart Brown, the Sardis Association was adjourned, by way of prayer, until 9:00 a.m. Satudary morning.

SATURDAY September 9, 1978

Met pursuant to adjournment amidst joyful and melodious singing from the Brethren we love so dearly.

Elder Monroe Jones of the New Salem Association opened the session with preaching.

- (6) By motion and second, it is ordered that the Clerk be appointed Secretary-Treasurer for 1978 and that he allowed \$50.00 for his expense.
- (7) By motion and second, it is ordered that the Clerk superintend the printing of our Minutes, that he have 4,000 copies printed and that he be allowed \$100.00 for his expenses.
- (8) The Circular Letter written by Elder Ernest Cochran was read by him and, by regular move and second, was accepted and ordered to be printed in our Minutes.
- (9) The Delegates who attended the Union Association last year made a report on the Request we sent to our esteemed Sister, the Union Association. All reports were favorable and our request was answered in full. Our Brethren were received in great love and harmony. Elder Fon Bowling reported that the Union Association had done as requested by the Sardis Association and the problem no longer exists. These Reports and the work done by Union Association were received by regular move and second.

(11) The Letter of Petition for membership in Sardis Association from Little Tavie Church was read and, on motion by Brother Stewart Brown and second by Brother Fred Muncy, the Little Tavie Church was accepted into full membership and fellowship of the Sardis Association.

(12) Called for the Tent Committee Report and, by move and second, received a report from Elder Clifford Maynard of little activity except paying for trailer license and storing the tent for next year.

(13) A move by Elder Steve Robinson, Jr., second by Brother J. T. Watts, to reprint Item (12) of our 1977 Minute met with an Objection from Brother Stewart Brown. Voting of the Delegates showed 55 in favor of the move and 10 against it. Therefore, Item (12) is reprinted as follows:

To answer a Query from Dix Fork Church regarding wearing apparel of the Sisters, the Committee on Arrangements, by regular move and second, requested the Moderator to appoint a Committee of Sardis Brethren to prepare an answer for consideration of the full Association at Saturday's session. Committee appointed as follows: Elder Wayne Herald, Brother Ralph W. E. Varney, Jr. and Brother James M. Ray.

On Motion by Elder Ernest Cochran and second by Elder James Gannon, both delegates from Dix Fork Church, the Association approved the Committee Report as its answer to the Query and discharged the Committee. The Committee Report is as follows:

In answer to the Query from the Dix Fork Church asking "Does the Sardis Association believe in Sisters wearing pants, slacks or shorts?" We, as an Advisory Council and not as a law making body say:

To answer this Query in the affirmative would be interpreted by some Brethren too liberally and they would say we have laid down the gate and opened the doors to anything and everything.

To answer this Query in the negative would be interpreted by some Brethren too strictly and they would say we have shut the door on everything and Committees would flow from Church to Church like water.

We believe the Sardis Association should advise the Churches to advise their members — both Brethren and Sisters — to dress soberly and modestly and to conduct themselves in a manner that becometh a Child of God. We believe that each Child of God will adorn themselves in such a manner that they can easily be identified from the World. We feel the Bible, the infallable Word of God, sets forth and the Spirit will teach us how we should dress and conduct ourselves.

We believe, and the Association has so stated in the past, that each Church in the Sardis Association holds the key to its own

door and is the sole judge of the conduct of its members so long as they follow the orthodox principles of religion and keep up a Godly discipline according to the rules of the Gospel as laid down in the Scriptures. In fact, Article 3 of our Constitution guarantees that the Association shall not infringe on the internal right of the Churches.

- (14) Read a Request from Dix Fork Church to change Item (12) of our 1977 Minute to read as follows: "That our Brethren not wear shorts so as to expose their bodies and should not go without shirts and keep their hair trimmed so as not to be offensive, and that our Sisters not wear pants, pant suits or shorts." After discussion, a move by Elder David Baisden and second by Brother George Martin to send the Request back to Dix Fork Church met with an Objection filed by Brother Mike Sheppard. A vote of the Delegates showed 33 in favor of the move and 34 against it. However, after much discussion the Dix Fork Church Delegates all agreed to take the Request back, reword it and bring it back next year for consideration.
- (15) The Association by regular move and second said that if a Sister has cut her hair, she should be asked to let it grow out; if she fails to do so and cuts her hair again, she will be excluded.
- (16) By motion and second it is ordered that we advise our Ministers of our Association not to marry people in adultry, where either man or woman has a living wife or husband.
- (17) In answer to the question, "Shall we receive into fellowship men or women having more than one wife or husband?" The Association by regular move and second said, "We advise the Churches not to receive into their fellowship any such, except those who have put away their companion for the cause of fornication, such cases to have Gospel or Church evidence of same."
- (18) A complete and thorough report of the Committee sent to Sardis Church last year was read by Brother Edwin May. After discussion and on move and second, the report was received and the Committee discharged. Further, by move and second, the Sardis Association advised the Sardis Church at its next meeting to recant and do away with all work concerning Johnny Adair since the first time he was excluded in 1968 unto the present time.
- (19) Requests from Turkey Creek Church, Buck Creek Church and Sidney Church asking for Sardis Church to be set aside for being in disorder were read. By move and second, the Requests were returned to these Churches for being out of order since they were not legally and properly brought because none of these Churches had visited Sardis Church with committees to work with her.

- (20) The Request from Mary Elizabeth Church to print the obituary of Brother George Fraley was granted by move and second.
- (21) The Committee on a convenient and permanent place to hold our Association made its report. Elder John P. Church stated little progress had been made because very little land is available and the cost of it is high. By move and second, it is ordered that we receive the report and keep the same committee who will report again next year.
- (22) By motion and second it is ordered that request for Union, Communion and Memorial Meetings be published in our Minutes.
- (23) By motion and second it is ordered that Obituaries of our deceased Brothers and Sisters that are in good standing with the Church at the time of death be printed in our Minutes. These are to be presented to the Clerk at the end of the Association. A charge of \$10.00 will be made for a picture printed with the Obituary, except pictures of Elders and their wives will continue to be printed free.
- (24) By move and second, the report of Brethren attending Union, Communion and Sister Association meetings was omitted.
- (25) No Request was received from the Churches to host the 1979 Sardis Association. Therefore, on motion and second, the verbal request to host our 1979 Association from Mt. Pleasant Church Delegate was granted. The Enon Church, Narrows Branch Church, Salem Church and Mary Elizabeth Church will co-host the Association.

The Mt. Pleasant Church is located on U. S. Route 119, mid-way between Pikeville, Kentucky and Williamson, West Virginia, at the junction of Kentucky 468.

- (26) By motion and second, it is ordered that we request all of our Churches, who can and want to, to send help to the Church that will host our next Association, the Mt. Pleasant Church.
- (27) A Committee was appointed to take the vote of the Delegates on who shall preach the Introductory Sermon next year; who shall be his alternate; and who shall prepare a Circular Letter for next year. They reported as follows and, on move and second, were discharged:

Elder Wayne Herald to preach Introductory Sermon Elder Ross Cline to be his alternate

Elder Kelly Castle to write the 1979 Circular Letter.

(28) By regular move and second, it is ordered that we, the Sardis Association, tender our deeply felt "thank you" to the Bent Branch Community and, as Elder Clifford Maynard writes:

We at the Bent Branch Church wish to express our sincere thanks to the Pike County Board of Education and the Johns Creek High School for the use of the lunch room; the Pike County Sheriff Department for directing traffic; Emma Grace Blankenship and family for use of the grounds to put our tent on; Thomas and Artie Ruth Taylor and other friends, Sisters, Brothers and

Churches for financial support; and the many wonderful people who helped change this job of hosting the Association from an atmost impossible task to a work of real joy.

Especially a big thank you to the cooks at Johns Creek High School and the Sisters and friends who did a truly remarkable job of feeding the people and, let's don't forget, all those good cakes and pies our Sisters and friends baked for us.

Again thank you and may God bless you all, each and every one

- (29) After reading of the Minutes by the Clerk they were, by regular move and second, approved as read and ordered to be signed by the Officers of the Sardis Association.
- (30) On motion by Brother J. T. Watts and second by Elder David L. Baisden, it is ordered that the Sardis Association adjourn to the time and place mentioned above.
- (31) The Sardis Association then adjourned by way of prayer offered by our beloved Elder Tommy Adair.

SUNDAY September 10, 1978

The sights and sounds of the family gathering in never seems to be the same and brings a warm and happy feeling over me. Elder Fon Bowling, Assistant Moderator of the Union Association and greatly beloved among all Associations, came next to the stand with tears of gladness for this Sabbath morning but also with sadness, realizing that for some of us this will be our last Association until we meet in Heaven. Brother





CONSTITUTION OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION

From a long series of experiences we, the OLD REGULAR BAPTIST CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST, being baptized upon a profession of faith in Christ are convinced of the necessity of a combination of Churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan of government.

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different Churches in our union and sent to represent them in the Association and, upon their producing Letters from their respective Churches certifying their appointment, they shall be entitled to a seat.

ARTICLE 2. In the Letters shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by Letter, dismissed, excluded, and deceased since our last Association.

ARTICLE 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord anything over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical power over the Churches nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any Church in the union.

 $ARTICLE\ 4$. The Association when convened shall be ruled by a regular and proper decorum.

ARTICLE 5. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk, each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 6. New Churches may be admitted into this union who shall petition by Letter and delegates and, if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received; and every Church in the union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.

ARTICLE 7. Every query presented by the Church to the Association, being first debated in their own Churches, shall be taken up by the Association.

ARTICLE 8. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the consideration of the Association, except when withdrawn by the one made it.

ARTICLE 9. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the Church with Minutes of the Association.

ARTICLE 10. We think it necessary that we should have an Association fund for defraying expenses of the same. We think it the duty of each Church in the union to contribute such sums as they think proper and to send it by their delegates to the Association; and such sums be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer chosen by the Association who shall be accountable for the money paid him by the Association, and paid out according to the Association.

ARTICLE 11. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of every Association shall be recorded by a Secretary appointed by the Association who shall receive a compensation for his services.

ARTICLE 12. The minutes of the Association shall be read, and corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association arises, unless the same is dispensed with.

ARTICLE 13. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made by a majority of the union, if deemed necessary.

ARTICLE 14. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of a majority of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 15. The Association shall have the power for the general union of the Churches; to preserve inviolable a chain of communion among the Churches; to give Churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty; to inquire into the cause of the Churches failing to represent themselves at any time in the Association; to appropriate the money contributed by the Churches for the Association fund to any purpose they may think proper; to appoint any member, by their consent, to transact any business which they see necessary; and they shall have power to withdraw from any Church in the union which violates the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox priniciples of religion; and to admit any orderly Minister of our order to seat with us. The Association shall have the right to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the Churches.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE 1. We believe in only one true and living God, the Father, the Son, and Holy Ghost; and these three are one, equal in power, essence and glory.

ARTICLE 2. We believe the Scripture of the Old and New Testaments of the Authorized King James Version of the Bible are the written words of God and are the only rules of faith and practice.

 $ARTICLE\ 3.$ We believe in the doctrine of election by grace, for by grace are ye saved through faith.

ARTICLE 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and of man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, therefore the Saviour is needed for our redemption.

ARTICLE 5. We believe that sinners are called to repentance and believe in the Gospel and regeneration of the soul and sealed with Holy Spirit of promise, and none shall fall away and be lost.

ARTICLE 6. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

ARTICLE 7. We believe that baptism is the ordinance of God's Church on earth and the mode of IMMERSION, back foremost, so as to cover all over.

ARTICLE 8. We believe that the Lord's Supper is the command

of the Saviour, and that by the use of bread and the fruit of the vine; and feet washing should be kept up until His second coming by His believers.

ARTICLE 9. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and the unjust, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal.

ARTCILE 10. We believe that no Minister has the right to administer the ordinances and commands of the Gospel except such as regularly ordained and baptized, and that by immersion by a legal administrator of the Gospel comes under the hands of a regularly chosen presbytery of the Church.

ARTICLE 11. We believe it to be the duty of all Church members to contribute for defraying all reasonable expenses of the Church, never forgetting the poor according to their several abilities.

ARTICLE 12. We believe that every doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge people in their sins or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving faith in Christ for salvation is erroneous, and such doctrine will be rejected by us.

ARTICLE 13. We believe that the Church of Christ is a congregation of faithful believers in Christ who have obtained fellowship with the Lord and one another, and have given themselves to the Lord and have agreed to keep up a Godly discipline according to the rules of the Gospel.

ARTICLE 14. We believe that Jesus Christ is the Head of the Church and the government thereof is upon His shoulders.

ARTICLE 15. None of the above Articles shall be considered as to hold with particular election and reporbation so as to make God partial, directly or indirectly, nor to injure any of the children of men; nor shall any of these Articles be altered without legal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM

ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

ARTICLE 2. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 3. Only one member shall speak at a time who shall arise from his seat and obtain consent from the Moderator when he is about to make his speech.

ARTICLE 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is through.

ARTICLE 5. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on the person who has spoken so as to make remarks on his slips or imperfections, but shall fairly state the cause as nearly as he can so as to convey his ideas.

ARTICLE 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association.

ARTICLE 7. No person shall speak more than three times on any subject without leave of the Association; and only five minutes at a time.

ARTICLE 8. No person shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of public speech.

ARTICLE 9. No member of the Association shall address another in any other term of appellation than that of "Brother".

ARTICLE 10. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit any member from speaking until he gives his light on any subject unless he violates the Rules of Decorum.

ARTICLE 11. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.

ARTICLE 12. The Moderator shall have the same right of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled; and he shall have no right to vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the deciding vote.

ARTICLE 13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of the Decorum shall be reproved by the Association as they think proper.
