The Sardis Association of Old Regular Baptist, the Church of Jesus Christ, assembled in the Business Room of the Sardis Association Building at 180 Brushy School Road, Varney, Pike County, Kentucky, with our host, the Pilgrims Home Church, on Friday before the second Saturday in September, 2008.

About the hour of 9:00 a.m. our Moderator, Elder Thomas J. Dials, came to the Stand and welcomed the congregation. Brother Tommy said, It is time to continue. It starts when we meet. It all starts with love. I hope you can go home and say you felt love. God is ready to bless us. If you don't get blessed it is your fault. We want you to feel love. We don't want a sister or brother from any association to go away and say they did not feel love. I love you so much. This is such a fearful place to face such a wonderful congregation. We are just one family. We are not going to have trouble; it has been good here this week. I am thankful to be here.

Elder Richard Lowe, having been chosen as alternate for this session's Introductory Sermon, came to the stand to preach the opening of the service. He proceeded as follows: I feel the very least among you brothers and sisters. I don't fear you, because you have shown me love. I know I have passed from death unto life because I love the brethren. It is all about love. I fear God this morning. I want Jesus Christ to be glorified and the Church to be edified. There is a hell to shun and a Heaven to gain. I believe we are just children; little boys and girls trying to get to Heaven. The word was with God and the word came to his own and his own received him not, but as many as received him, he gave them power to become the sons of God. I am so thankful I have been made a child of God. We should be thankful. Christ came not to condemn the world but to call sinners to repentance. Sinners need to repent. We ought to love one another. God is love. The angels of God cannot die. There are angels of satan that will die, die and never die. Jesus came and suffered death for you and me. He came and died for the sin whole world. He is a savior to the whole world. He talks to his children. He talks to me. Paul asked what should I do. The Lord told him to go to Damascus. Jesus died on the cross and the Roman soldier came. Jesus Christ is the best thing that ever happened to me. The Roman soldier was supposed to break his legs. Jesus had already given up the ghost. The soldier pierced him in the side and blood went toward the former sea and the hinder sea. Jesus is a special savior to them that believe. They wrapped Jesus's body in grave clothes and put upon his face a napkin. Early in the morning Mary came to the tomb. God had already rolled the stone away. The grave clothes were in one place and napkin in another. Mary was going to anoint the body of Jesus. Mary met Jesus and did not know who he was. This is the first resurrection. Then she recognized Jesus and he said, "Mary, touch me not, for I have not yet ascended." Go and tell the brothers. We live by experience. Parents keep praying for your children. Pray. It is all about love. What a good God we have.

Brother Richard led in prayer.

Elder Albert Cable came to preach the Introductory Sermon stating that he has already felt the presence of the Lord. He preached as follows: I love his sweet Spirit. I spent the night asking God to help me. I hope and pray he will set me upon the mountain. I want to praise God and give him the glory. I have prayed to God if it be his will to give me something to say. If there ever was a time people should call upon the Lord, it is now. He was a perfect sacrifice. Paul said, "I laboured more abundantly than they all; yet not I, but the grace of God which was in me." I hope and pray if there is one that does not know the Lord, now is the time to rise up and call upon him. There is one body, and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, in you all. He sang the song, "Oh, Sinner Man." He asked, how will it be with you when the Lord comes?

He said, without the blood being shed we would all be lost. Agrippa said unto Paul, Almost thou persuaded me to be a Christian. And Paul said, I would be to God, that not only thou, but also all that hear me this day, were both almost, and together such as I am, except these bonds. Without the shedding of blood there would be no remission of sin. We are justified by the resurrection of Christ. I can't preach without the Lord. Paul said we preach not ourselves but Jesus Christ, and him crucified. Adam transgressed God's law. God took skins and made coats to hide their nakedness. The next place there was shedding of blood is when Cain slew Abel. That was the blood of Abel. The Lord told the congregation of Israel to take a lamb and kill it and apply the blood to the two side posts and on the lintel. The death angel will pass over the houses where the blood is on the door post and the lintel. The blood has to be applied to the heart today. You are bought with a price, that being the precious blood of Jesus Christ. I can see that blood coming out of Egypt and it being applied to our souls today. We are bought by the precious blood of Jesus Christ. We could not be justified if not for the resurrection. When Jesus was hung upon the cross a fountain was opened up. Jesus Christ made an offering for us and if people will call upon him there is a better place to go. For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. When the soldier pierced Jesus in the side, blood and water came forth. He made a way for not only me, but to all that would come to him.

Christ is the first resurrection. Blessed are they that have a part in the first resurrection. There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit. It is far, far better felt, than told. Give God all the praise and glory. There is an inner man and an outer man. The inner man is ready to go, the outer man is waiting for a change. And as we have borne the image of the earthy, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly. And that which thou sowest, thou sowest not that body that shall be, but bare grain, it may chance of wheat, or of some other grain; but God giveth it a body as it hath pleased him and to every seed his own body. We are redeemed by the blood. If you are bought by the precious blood of the Lamb, you will live in the house of the Lord forever. If Christ had not risen we would be found false witnesses of God. And this is the will of him that sent me, that every one which seeth the son, and believeth on him, may have everlasting life. It took the precious blood of Christ. It took him hanging upon the cross. Jesus said, "I am the resurrection and the life." Christ is the only one worthy to open that little book and loosen the seals. Call upon the Lord while he may be found. He is just a prayer away. Remember that precious blood and the resurrection.

The Sardis Association delegates and a large delegation from our Corresponding Sister Associations remained in the Business Room for the Work of this Association and, as is our custom, the many non-delegate Brethren, Sisters and friends were dismissed to assemble in the Preaching Room to hear the preaching of:

Dials, our Moderator, called to seats the delegates from our Churches sent to represent them in this Association and the delegates sent by our Corresponding Sister Associations. Brother Tommy called upon Elder W. Lee Roberts, of the New Salem Association, to open the Service.

Brother W. Lee stated that he was very thankful today and glad to meet the brothers and sisters. We know we have passed from death unto life because we love the brethren. He that is born of God is born of love. There is no hatred in him. Jesus said, "If you believe in God, believe also in me." I go away to prepare a place for you. I am thankful that one drop of blood that fell from the cross fell upon me. There are ways that seem right but the end thereof is death. He is the way, truth and life. We would not be here if it were not for him. I have felt the Lord today. Let prayer and intercession be made today. I believe my name is written in the Lamb's book of life. I believe I will hear it called.

He then led in prayer.

The Sardis Association then proceeded as follows:

- (1) Our Moderator, Elder Thomas J. Dials, came to the stand and asked everyone to continue to pray. He said to look to the good Lord for our help. We need to show our love to our sister Associations.

- (5) The Committee on Finance reported \$5,915.00 received from the Churches as reported in the Statistical Table and after turning this amount over to the Treasurer was discharged be regular move and second.
- (6) The Moderator appointed a Committee to arrange the preaching for Friday night and Saturday consisting of one delegate from each Church in the Sardis Association, and the entire delegation from the host church.
- (7) The Moderator appointed the following Committee of Tellers to take the vote of the Sardis Association delegates for Officers to serve the Sardis Association for the coming year and instructed the delegates to vote for a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk:

- (14) The Moderator called for newly organized Churches or other Churches of our same faith and order desiring to take up correspondence with the Sardis Association, and for Associations desiring to take up correspondence with the Sardis Association and none responded.
- (15) The Moderator appointed a Committee on Arrangements consisting of one delegate from each Church and all the Officers of the Sardis Association, along with the entire delegation from each of our Corresponding Sister Associations, to arrange the business for Saturday's session of the Sardis Association. By regular move and second the committee will meet at 2:00 p.m. today.
- (16) On motion from Elder Richard Lowe, second by Brother Willis Fletcher, Jr., the Sardis Association was adjourned until 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning, September 13, 2008.

SATURDAY September 12, 2008

Met pursuant to adjournment at the Sardis Association Building where, about the hour of 9:00 a.m., our Moderator, Elder Thomas J. Dials, came to the stand with no electricity in the building and said that we may not have natural power, but there is power here with us today. God does not need for us to have any trouble. There is a good feeling here. The Lord is here with us today. Watch every word we say and everything we do. All I want to do is to be able to go home in the morning. Let us just rejoice all day. This is a three day worship service. We owe it all to God. Sometimes that little Spirit picks us up. I love everyone of you. By my love and kindness have I drawn thee. I love this old time way. Let us stay on the old path. I am waiting on that day. What I feel right now is worth more than anything I can eat. What a great God he have.

He then called upon Elder Dennis Elkins, of the Northern New Salem Association, to open these services.

Brother Dennis came forth and asked for prayers. He stated he felt too little. He sang the song, "The Door of Mercy." Brother Dennis preaching was overshadowed by the praising of God by many brothers and sisters. God truly blessed his people to give him the honor and glory he so richly deserves. Brother Dennis preached "that we need to live upright before God and call upon him this morning. God wants us in everything we do to edify him." Surely God looked down upon this little band today and was well pleased for today his name was held high above all others. Brother Dennis then led in prayer.

The Sardis Association then proceeded as follows:

- (1) Called the roll of delegates and marked the absentees.
- (2) Read the Bill of Arrangements and, by move and second, received the report and discharged the Committee on Arrangements.
- (3) Elder W. H. Cochran, chosen to prepare the Circular Letter for this session of the Sardis Association, came to the Stand and read his letter. By regular move and second, the Letter was received and ordered to be printed in our Minutes. At this time the Moderator released the Brethren, Sisters and friends to assemble in the Preaching room.
- (4) Read the report of the committee appointed to work with the Antioch Church, to examine their practice and doctrine, go to their business meetings and to report back to the association. This report reads as follows:

During the 2007 session of the Sardis Association of Old Regular Baptist The Church of Jesus Christ the Antioch Church of the Union Bethlehem Association of United Baptist located at Wayne, WV presented a Letter of Correspondence to the Sardis Association and during the Saturday proceedings the matter was handled as follows:

Item (4): Read a letter from the Antioch Church of the Union Bethlehem Association of United Baptist located at Wayne, WV stating their desire to take up correspondence with the Sardis Association of Old Regular Baptist as provided in Article 14 of the 2006 Minutes of the Sardis Association. After many questions and much debate a motion was made by Elder Gary Young and second by Elder Charles Jarrell to receive this church under watch care for one year and for Elder Thomas J. Dials, our Moderator, and Elder Hobart Hamilton, our Assistant Moderator, to appoint a committee to work with this church. A motion was made by Elder Richard Lowe and second by Elder Bobby Scott, Sr. to receive their letter and to give them the right hand of fellowship under working watch care for one year. Elder Tom Dials and Elder Hobart Hamilton appointed all officers of the Sardis Association, Elder Elbert Sesco, Elder Leonard Napier and Elder Bobby Scott, Sr. to examine their practice and doctrine, go to their business meetings and report back to this Association.

On November 24, 2007 the Committee consisting of the following met at the Antioch Church:

The Antioch Church having been seated and being in new business welcomed this committee and invited the committee to speak.

A motion came to the floor by Elder Bobby Scott, Sr. for Elder Thomas J. Dials to serve as moderator and Brother Archie Prince to serve as Clerk of this committee. The motion was seconded by Elder Edward Lee Smith.

Elder Thomas J. Dials advised that the purpose of this committee is to protect the Sardis Association and to protect the Antioch Church. He stated that we need to show love.

Elder Hobart Hamilton stated that we are here to examine the doctrine and their church work. Also, he advised all that the Antioch Church is not on trial and that any questions should be presented orderly and with love.

Elder Tom Dials stated that we are here to help and not to hurt. He asked if members of the committee have any questions.

Elder Bobby Scott, Sr. stated that when he asked questions it is not to harm anyone. He said he believes in everything being out in the open. We have a responsibility to report back to the Association on what we have done. He said we know that we pass from death unto life because we love the brethren. Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. Take away hope and you take away faith. There is a place to apply hope and there is a place to apply knowledge. There are two men in the race, the inward man and the outward man. The outward man is not yet delivered. He is still waiting upon deliverance. Man does not have eternal life in the flesh but must wait for the resurrection, therefore we cannot testify of something that we have not received yet in the flesh. By his Spirit we know that we are the children of God. For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God. When a preacher is in the spirit and says he knows he is going to Heaven, I would say, amen. This is where the knowledge is.

The brothers of the Antioch Church acknowledged that they agree with what Brother Bobby has stated.

Elder Bobby Scott, Sr. said the pale horse and his rider are upon our trail. We must have the Spirit on the inside. Brother Bobby stated that he believes that the brothers of the Antioch Church agreeing is a good thing and we can report that back to the Association. It is good that we are in agreement with one another. He said your faith shall be tried. Faith is the substance hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. There are two hopes in the Bible. One hope is the one we have not seen. This is faith. One hope is the anchor of the soul, both sure and steadfast.

Elder Elbert Sesco stated that he is glad to be here. God's people can feel the Spirit. If we have a hope down in our soul, we have Jesus Christ. There is a wheel in a wheel. We are controlled by what we have in our heart. We are led by the Holy Spirit of God. You cannot separate Jesus Christ from being down in your soul. Nothing good dwelleth in this flesh, Jesus being anchored in our soul is our hope. I want Jesus down in my soul. As many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God. Jesus lets us know we are still in the race. I keep hoping and praying that I have a home with God. He will never leave us or forsake us. I hope I can go to Heaven. I love the brothers of the Antioch Church.

Elder Leonard Napier stated that be believes the partition of the Antioch Church has strengthened the Sardis Association. The brothers of the Antioch Church have stated that they are willing to live by the orders of the Sardis Association. I would like for us to report back to the Association that we are in 100% agreement.

Elder Edward Lee Smith said he would like to see us come together in love and peace. We need to talk to one another about things.

Elder Hobart Hamilton said some don't believe that two men are in the race. I have seen brothers troubled in the flesh and when the Spirit came along they became humble. He said brothers you need to protect your church. He advised the Antioch Church that if a brother preaches false doctrine to not put that brother back in the stand. This does not mean a brother we disagreed with on just one point of doctrine.

Elder Bobby Scott said the outward man is kept by the grace of God. He that is in you is stronger than he that is in the world.

Elder Hobart Hamilton said that there may be confusion about knowledge, but there is never a doubt about God.

The consensus from all that are present is that we are all in agreement on the points of doctrine brought out here tonight. There is a good feeling of all and the Spirit has brought satisfaction to us. We agree that this Church has a good solid practice.

Elder Thomas J. Dials dismissed the committee until the fourth Saturday night in March at 7:00 p.m.

On March 22, 2008 the Committee consisting of the following met at the Antioch Church:

The Antioch Church, in session and under unfinished business, welcomed the Committee and turned the meeting over to the Committee with Elder Thomas J. Dials standing as Moderator of the Committee. Brother Tom expresses his pleasure in being at the Antioch Church and in being with brethren and sisters who have traveled much among the Sardis Churches.

For a matter of record Brother Tom asked if this Church holds to a closed communion and the reply from the Church Moderator was yes. At this time Brother Tom asked if other members of the committee have any questions?

Elder Bobby Scott, Sr. stated that he is well pleased with this Church, but don't know what might be asked by members of the Association. He said he feels home with the Antioch Church as much as with any Sardis Church and came tonight more to fellowship.

Elder Hobart Hamilton stated that he is well pleased with the way the brothers and sisters have represented this church. He said he likes their doctrine and feels that they are willing to do anything we have required of them. The spirit has satisfied me and the brothers and sisters of the Antioch Church have satisfied me. He advised the Antioch Church to do what they have been doing: to let the Lord direct them. This is a great big world and it is getting worse each day. We need to live so our families can follow after us. May God bless you. We need you as much as you need us.

Elder Leonard Napier stated that it is such an honor to us for you to be with the Sardis Association. We need to pull together.

Elder Edward Smith stated that we need the Antioch Church. We need everyone we can get. He said he is glad the Antioch Church is with us.

Elder Clarence Mathis, Moderator of the Antioch Church, expressed their appreciation to the Sardis Association. He said, "we have been treated well. Much better that we deserve. We are saddened from the loss of our brothers and sisters. Lord, help us as your people to look like Christians, act like Christians and be Christians."

Elder Tom Dials stated that no more questioning is necessary as far as he was concerned. He asked if there were any more comments?

Elder Billy Howard, Assistant Moderator of the Antioch Church, said," I love that great love that was born down in my life. I love you brothers and sisters like I have been with you all my life." He quoted St. John Chapter 3 Verse 16. He said, "I am going home and I am with you forever whether you have us or not."

Motion by Elder Hobart Hamilton and second by Elder Edward Smith to let this conclude our visits as a Committee and we can report back to the Association.

Elder Tom Dials stated we are coming together. We are getting close to home. He dismissed this Committee from this meeting, but not as a working Committee, until such time as we need to come together again.

Elder Tom Dials called the meeting to order. Brother Tom inquired for the opinion of the committee as to how this should be handled during the Association. The consensus of the committee is that our written report should be turned over to the committee on arrangements. He then asked if there are any issues we need to discuss.

STANDING ITEMS

Item 1. Item 14 of our 1975 Minutes is reprinted, without the preamble, as follows:

Sardis Association

September 13, 1975

of Old Regular Baptist

Dingess, West Virginia

Brethren:

In answer to the Query from the Dix Fork Church asking, "Does the Sardis Association believe in Sisters wearing pants, slacks or shorts?" We, as an Advisory body, say:

To answer this query in the affirmative would be interpreted by some Brethren too liberally and they would say we have laid down the gate and opened the doors to anything and everything.

To answer this Query in the negative would be interpreted by some Brethren too strictly and they would say we have shut the door on everything and Committees would flow from Church to Church like water. We believe the Sardis Association should advise the Churches to advise their members, both Brethren and Sisters, to dress soberly and modestly and to conduct themselves in a manner that becometh a Child of God. We believe that each Child of God will adorn themselves in a manner that they can easily be identified from the world. We feel the Bible, the infallible Word of God, sets forth and the Spirit will teach us how we should dress and conduct ourselves.

We believe, and the Association has so stated in the past, that each Church in the Sardis Association holds the key to its own door and is the sole judge of the conduct of its members as long as they follow the orthodox principles of religion and keep up a Godly discipline according to the rules of the Gospel as laid down in the Scriptures. In fact, Article 3 of our Constitution guarantees that the Association shall not infringe on any internal right of the Churches.

- Item 4. It is ordered that we advise our Churches not to allow their Ministers to preach with any Minister who has two living women. (1919 minute)
- **Item 5.** It is ordered that requests for Union, Communion and Memorial meetings be published in our Minutes.

Item 6. By motion and second, it is ordered that Obituaries of our deceased Brethren and Sisters that are in good standing with the Churches at the time of death be printed in our Minutes. Also, friends of the Churches that are recommended by the Churches be printed in a separate section of our minute. These are to be presented to the Clerk at the end of the Association. A charge of \$15.00 will be made for a picture with the obituary, except that pictures of an Elder or his wife will continue to be printed free.

Clerks Note: Please note the above order - it is incumbent upon the churches in the Sardis Association that they be the screen and recommending body of Obituaries of Friends to be printed in our minutes and identify the same (by note or otherwise) to the Clerks when the Obituary is turned in. Each Church Moderator is further required to screen and approve any Obituary of a Friend of the Church and to reject any Obituary that has language that is offensive to the Sardis Association.

Item 7. "We the Sardis Association, advise our Sister Churches that it is not our practice to use sisters or double-married men in any function of the ministry, including leading prayer, in any of our Church services."

Item 8. By regular move and second, it is ordered that Item (15) of our 1999 Minute be reprinted as follows:

"It is a sin for anyone to put away their wife or husband for any cause except for fornication and marry another. In regards to going behind one's experience or receiving one in the Church with more than one living companion, we say that each Church shall be the sole judge to the validity of one's experience. Churches should not be forced to receive members, however, that would destroy the body. (Receive should be interpreted to include all means of receiving members.)"

SUNDAY

SEPTEMBER 14, 2008

About the hour of 10:00 a.m. our Moderator, Elder Thomas J. Dials, stated, "how powerful the Lord is." Our meetings started about a week ago. Every time the Lord blesses us to breath and to get up in the morning, it is a blessing. There are plenty of blessings in the storehouse. When he blesses us we know something about it. The Lord blessed us during the church work. In the morning I am looking for the day when it won't break up. Look forward and get hold of Jesus. He then announced the arrangements.

Elder Jerry Overstreet came to the stand and asked for prayers. He said without the Lord we are nothing, ye less than nothing. He said, "Love has been here every day." He sang the song, "The Blood is Still There." He preached as follows: The apostle Paul said I know nothing except Jesus and him crucified. This way is paved with love. For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life. You will hear his voice, harden not your heart, as in the provocation in the days of temptation in the wilderness. This day has life in it and more abundantly. One man's disobedience brought death, one man brought life. There is no other way to be forgiven except through Jesus Christ. Today is the day of salvation. There is one Lord, one God; ye are one building fitly framed together which groweth into an holy temple in the Lord. This is the old Church today. Though I speak with tongues of men and of angels and have not charity I am become as sounding brass or a tinkling cymbal. From the heart man believeth unto salvation. Peter said to Jesus, where else is there to go seeing you have eternal life? I will put my laws in their mind and write them in their hearts and I will be to them a God and they shall be to me a people. We have such a good God. The eyes of the Lord are over the righteous, and his ears are open unto their prayers, but the face of the Lord is against them that do evil. The Lord is such a consuming fire today. You can't come to the Son unless the Father draws you.

Elder Leon Robinson led in prayer.

Elder Danny Belcher came forth stating, "I have found no matter how wonderful it is, it is no better for me than it is here today." I thank my Lord because he loves me and he loves you. He preached as follows: If I go not away the comforter will not come unto you, but if I depart I will send him unto you. We are a little closer today, closer to our home land. Man must obey, he must believe from the depths of his heart, doubting nothing. When I go to do good, evil is present. Old satan comes along. For several days old satan has been pushed aside. I have felt the love of God. You know more by the Spirit, than you do by nature. The Holy Ghost was sent that we might have a witness. The word was with God, the word was God and dwelled upon this earth. From the opening of this Association the love of God and the Blood of the Lamb have been preached. Jesus came because of love, he shed that precious blood. God made a better way and his name is Jesus. We're supposed to be like Christ. He is our keeper. We have to have that keeper down on the inside and that takes care of back sliding. If your are made whole through the blood of Jesus it will last forever. Jesus made a promise and said, "If I go away, I will come again." We are the children of God almighty. There are two men in the race. We must be drawn by the power of God. It is all about love but you must have the Lamb to have love. God sent his only son to die for us.

Jealousy caused Esau to want to kill Jacob. Jacob's mother warned him. Jacob put his house in order. A house without order cannot stand. We need to love the creator not the world. We draw the world by our love and kindness. We are to show all men and all women that we love them. If you have not felt that love you need to get down on your knees and ask yourself, why?

Jacob went out to meet Esau and they embraced each others and exchanged gifts. In this life how can two men walk together unless they come to an agreement.

I believe that Jesus is the son of God. He died and went back to the Father. Jesus is making intercessions for us. He will present us to God. Satan will send messengers to us and bring confusion. There has been no confusion in this Association. Jesus said a new commandment, "Love one another." Jesus suffered and died so we could live again.

I was walking down the driveway and saw two sparrows lying on their backs. I asked God what this meant. He said for me to pick them up, there was not a feather out of place. God said this is your uncle and your mother, they won't be here long. They both died soon after that. If God takes note of a little sparrow how much more will he take note of one of his little children.

I hope every word is established of God. When my mother was sick I went to see her and she asked my sisters to leave the room. My mother told me to quit praying for her to stay on this earth. I told her I could not do that. She asked me to pray that God's will be done. When walking through the door I heard her pray "Lord, if it be your will, come and take me home."

God talks to me in a small still voice. You had better get ready. I give you a great warning. Get ready as fast as you possibly can. Sometimes I get down in the valley, wonder and have doubts. Sometime I must go back to the experience I had with Jesus and the doubt is removed.

You must have faith. By grace through faith are you saved. You must come through faith to get to that grace. Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. That substance is Christ.

Elder Hobart Hamilton followed Brother Danny. Brother Hobart said about forty years ago he was struggling with the call. I met a man when in trouble that can teach you more in a moment than you can learn in a lifetime from the world. I want to go to Heaven, I want my children to go to Heaven, I want yours to go. Over in glory, anybody that will come is welcome. If you feel the Spirit of the Lord you better say, thank you. Everyone can be what they want, but I am an Old Regular Baptist and proud of it.

When I was in sin and far from home there were no Old Regular Baptist to talk to. Jesus has not changed. When I was living in Pennsylvania, one day Jesus came by. I cried and begged but I could not get better. I could not save myself. Take up your cross and follow Jesus.

I have love for everybody. I hope we can treat the world so good they will want to be part of us. We need to do things with a humble heart. You cannot get in touch with God by being high minded. I have had more since I began serving the Lord than when serving satan. You need to put things in God's hands.

God is so wonderful. You may want to talk mean to me, but I don't want to talk mean to you. When God's Spirit comes along the dread leaves.. I love this Church.

Zacchaeus wanted to see Jesus and climbed up a sycamore tree. He climbed up far enough to see Jesus. Don't think if you call upon the Lord he is going to go to someone else. I have felt so close to God's people this weekend. We need to think about things that will bring us together and keep us together. There will come a day when Jesus is coming to get his children. I don't know everything, but I know that I am not the man I used to be. I don't talk the way I used to, I don't go to the places I used to and I don't have the heart I used to have. God took all that away.

If brothers and sisters want to grow, ask God to help. If brothers and sisters want to understand the scriptures, asked God to help. Pray for one another. Pray for the other Associations. I know anybody born of the love of God, they are the children of God.

Jesus said to Zacchaeus come down. I will abide in thy house. Zacchaeus told Jesus that he gave goods to the poor. Repentance is the only way to Heaven. If you will repent and make things right with the Father and Son no one can take that away from you. You don't have to go to school to know about the Lord. I have felt God's love today. You might be poor, but if you get Jesus in your soul you are the richest man in the world. God commanded man to repent. If you repent, God will save you.

Elder Thomas J. Dials came next and said don't forget that good Spirit here today. God sent his son so you could live again. I had to become sorry. If you don't become sorry you will never go to Heaven. You must turn it all over to him. You must deny your very self and put Jesus first. I got in trouble over things I had done. I knew there was something I needed to be afraid of. Today is the day of salvation. Harden not you hearts. Some people tell you after you die you have a space of time to get right. But I tell you that is not right.

There is one leading us, one directing us. He has directed me many years. There is something in man that keeps man in order. You must get the man on the inside. The man on the inside must get a drink of living water. You must get cleansed. I got hold of a mother that cleaned me on the inside and it came to the outside. I believe the man on the inside gets the Holy Ghost baptism that will keep the man on the outside.

God had a cleansing process in the Old Testament for leprosy. God told Aaron to take two birds and cedar wood. Kill one bird in a vessel over running water. Take the living bird, dip it in the blood of the bird that was killed over the running water and turn the living bird loose.

A man came into my life and burdened me. I had to give it all to him. I had to come willing to die. That blood is still there for our children. You must get in a condition that when he comes again that he will find a good people.

The plan of salvation is older that the hills. I am glad today. God told Noah to build an ark that it was going to rain. There is a plan. Can you see the little baby lying in the manger? They rejected him and they are still rejecting him today. There is life inside this Church. You must be born not of flesh but by the Spirit of God. I had prayed and prayed. I cried one night just one more time. If you don't have the Lord you need him today to have eternal life.

I heard of a place where there is no death. The street is of gold and the walls are of jasper. I am going down in the grave for a while but God is going to get us out and take us home to glory. Reach out and get in the right way. If you shut off God, you shut yourself off.

When he gave me something on the inside he turned me loose. He changed my life. He gave me blood and he gave me living water. Reach out and get hold of Jesus.

CIRCULAR LETTER

Dear Brothers and Sisters of the Grand Old Sardis Association,

I stand here in weakness hoping to address you and all our correspondence, having been chosen last year to write a Circular Letter. I want to thank the brothers that had enough confidence in me to make this choice. It is an honor and yet it is a task for me since I am not an educated man, and my knowledge and understanding is very limited. God knows my heart. I am trying my best not to let nature lead me. I trust I am being led by the Spirit of God. I have made many attempts and failed. Then one morning about five o'clock, I was lying in bed it seemed I heard a voice say "peace, write about peace." Then I thought about the old association and I said out loud, Lord let peace flow like a river. Then I thought, if we let the Spirit lead, it will bring peace. The Lord said, "my peace I give unto you; my peace I leave with you not like the world gives, give I unto you." The only way peace can come to the outside is if it starts on the inside. We read that Jethro, Moses father in law, advised him. He said, "I go in peace." When Moses gave a charge to the children of Israel, he said least there be a man, woman, family or tribe that they go from serving a true and living God and serve the other gods, although they will say, I will bless myself and I will have peace. The Lord will not spare him: the Lord will blot out his name from under Heaven. Again the only true peace is found in Christ Jesus.

Now we know with peace comes responsibilities. The verse of an old song comes to mind, "Oh, what peace we often forfeit, Oh, what needless pain we bare, all because we do not carry everything to God in prayer." It makes me think sometimes the difference between trying things on our own and letting God do the leading. For instance, Peter and the fishermen who were with him, what they experienced. They went from shallow water into the deep then he came back into the shallow water and had given up. It also says, "words that are fitly spoken are like apples of gold and a pitcher of silver."

Paul writes, now I beseech you brothers mark them which cause division and offences contrary to the doctrine which you have learned and avoid them for they are such that serve not our Lord Jesus Christ but their own bellies, and with their fair speech they deceive the hearts of the simple, but the God of peace shall bruise satan under your feet. Paul writes, therefore being justified by faith we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ by whom also we have access by faith into this grace wherein we stand and rejoice in hope of the glory of God. Not only so, but we glory in tribulations also knowing, in tribulations works patience and patience, experience and experience, hope and hope maketh not ashamed because the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us. So, since we are saved by grace through faith, I don't believe we could enjoy the benefits of grace without faith. Now brothers we must be careful in our housekeeping or we will let little foxes devour the whole vine. Another thing that bothers me is the pride among us today.

My mother told me of an old uncle and aunt. They only had one pair of shoes between them. They would have to take time about going to church. He would wear them on Saturday and she would wear them on Sunday. This is determination without pride. And it comes to my mind quite often when I was very young. I was at an old cemetery and there was a crowd of people gathered at a grave site. They were clothed very fine. Upon the hill was an old Baptist preacher standing by a grave, he was a poor man dressed very modest. One of the people came up to him and ask him to come to the grave site and hold prayer. As he started walking down the hill he began singing, I'm not ashamed to own my Lord. I don't think I will ever forget that. The old brother has been dead for years. Now having said this, don't misunderstand me, there is nothing wrong with dressing nice. But also remember, God hates a proud look.

Some talk about our hope. When I was a sinner I had a hope, but the spirit that God puts in all of us, let me know where that hope would take me. So with that hope aided by faith, I began to seek for a different hope. As I began to seek for shelter, as Paul writes when he fled for refuge to lay hold upon the hope that was set before him, which hope we have an anchor of the soul both sure and stedfast and that which entereth into that within the veil. So when I am in the Spirit and come to the knowledge that I have an anchor to my soul and I am also anchored in Christ Jesus. That makes Christ Jesus my hope. That is as good as it gets in this life, because that hope brings good quality and the ability to withstand temptations of this world.

Right now I could write a book on changes that has come among the Old Regular Baptist family. Many are good and I will sadly say some are not good. God has blessed me to live here on this earth over eighty years. I guess I just get lonesome for that old time way because I sought for it and I believe I found it. I don't believe in side roads or detours.

The Bible says, "except the Lord build the house, the labor is in vain." Now don't think for one minute I am saying anything against the church or the association, though we must be careful. Idon't believe there has ever been no greater institution on earth that has brought so much peace, love and comfort to mankind than she has.

God set her up and I believe she was in his mind from the beginning. He will come back to get her at a set and appointed time and present her to the father.

Now I must close, but I must say for fear we become partakers of someone else's evil deeds. Let's be careful what we allow preached in the stands. I hope this is received in the same spirit it was written. I love you all and whether this is received or rejected, I will still love you anyway. Farewell to all until we meet again. If not here, I hope in glory.



Dad and Mom lived on the Sacramento River and they were surrounded by the river, trees and fields where the farmers around him planted beautiful rows of corn and other crops. Down the center of these fields is a paved road and he walked this road every day for almost forty years. He would don his straw hat and pickup his "walking stick" and start out on his four mile walk. His family all knew that on these daily walks, he talked, prayed and rejoiced with the Lord. He never missed those walks unless it was pouring rain or freezing cold. Oh, what a rejoicing that must have been when he was called home and started his walk on that Golden Road to Heaven!

Brother Henry's family and his faith in the Lord were his life and he would tell everyone to love the Lord and read the Bible. He never recovered physically from the stroke he had in March of 2005 and although he deteriorated in body, he never gave up loving the Lord or loving his family. We miss him deeply and daily grieve his passing. He was an example to us all and we have a blessed hope that we all will be together one day.


SIMON STACY

CONSTITUTION OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION

From a long series of experiences we, the OLD REGULAR BAPTIST CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST, being baptized upon a profession of faith in Christ are convinced of the necessity of a combination of Churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan of government.

- **ARTICLE 1.** The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different Churches in our union and sent to represent them in the Association and, upon their producing Letters from their respective Churches certifying their appointment, they shall be entitled to a seat.
- **ARTICLE 2**. In the Letters shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by Letter, dismissed, excluded, and deceased since our last Association.
- **ARTICLE 3**. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord anything over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical power over the Churches nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any Church in the Union.
- **ARTICLE 4**. The Association when convened shall be ruled by a regular and proper decorum.
- **ARTICLE 5**. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assi stant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.
- **ARTICLE 6**. New Churches may be admitted to this union who shall petition by Letter and delegates and, if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received; and every Church in the union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.
- **ARTICLE** 7. Every query presented by the Church to the Association, being first debated in their own Churches, shall be taken up by the Association.
- **ARTICLE 8**. Every motion made and seconded shall come under consideration of the Association, except when withdrawn by the one who made it.
- **ARTICLE 9.** The Association shall endeavor to furnish the Churches with Minutes of the Association.
- **ARTICLE 10**. We think it necessary that we should have an Association Fund for defraying the expenses of the same. We think it the duty of each Church in the union to contribute such sums as they think proper and to send it by their delegates to the Association; and such sums be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer chosen by the Association who shall be accountable for the money paid him by the Association, and paid out according to the Association.
- **ARTICLE 11**. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of every Association shall be recorded by a Secretary appointed by the Association who shall receive a compensation for his services.
- **ARTICLE 12**. The minutes of the Association shall be read, and corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Cl erk before the Association rises, unless the same is dispensed with.
- **ARTICLE 13**. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made by a majority of the union, if deemed necessary.
- **ARTICLE 14**. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by the will of the majority of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 15. The Association shall have the power to provide for the general union of the Churches; to preserve inviolable a chain of communion among the Churches; to give Churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty; to inquire into the cause of the Churches failing to represent themselves at any time in the Association; to appropriate the money contributed by the Churches for the Association fund to any purpose they may think proper; to appoint any member, by their consent, to transact any business which they see necessary; and they shall have the power to withdraw from any Church in the union which violates the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion; and to admit any orderly Minister of our order to seat with us. The Association shall have the right to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the Churches.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION

- **ARTICLE 1**. We believe in only one true and living God; the Father, the Son and Holy Ghost; and these three are one, equal in power, essence and glory.
- **ARTICLE 2**. We believe the scripture of the Old and New Testaments of the Authorized King James Version of the Bible are the written words of God and are the only rules of faith and practice.
- **ARTICLE 3**. We believe in the doctrine of election by grace, for by grace are ye saved through faith.
- **ARTICLE 4**. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and of man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, therefore the Saviour is needed for our redemption.
- **ARTICLE 5**. We believe that sinners are called to repentance and believe in the Gospel and regeneration of the soul and sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise, and none shall fall away and be lost.
- **ARTICLE 6**. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.
- **ARTICLE** 7. We believe that baptism is the ordinance of God's Church on earth and the mode IMMERSION, back foremost, so as to cover all over.
- **ARTICLE 8**. We believe that the Lord's Supper is the command of the Saviour, and that by use of bread and the fruit of the vine, and feet washing should be kept up until his second coming by his believers.
- **ARTICLE 9**. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and the unjust, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal.
- **ARTICLE 10**. We believe that no Minister has the right to administer the ordinances and commands of the Gospel except such as are regularly baptized by immersion of a legal administrator of the Gospel and ordained coming under the hands of a regularly chosen presbytery of the Church.
- **ARTICLE 11**. We believe it to be the duty of all Church members to contribute for defraying all reasonable expenses of the Church, never forgetting the poor according to their several abilities.
- **ARTICLE 12**. We believe that every doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge people in their sins or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving faith in Christ for salvation is erroneous, and such doctrine shall be rejected by us.
- **ARTICLE 13**. We believe that the Church of Jesus Christ is a congregation of faithful believers in Christ who have obtained fellowship with the Lord and one another, and have given themselves to the Lord and have agreed to keep up a Godly discipline according to the rules of the Gospel.
- **ARTICLE 14**. We believe that Jesus Christ is the head of the Church and the government thereof is upon His Shoulders.

- **ARTICLE 15.** We believe that a sanctioned marriage of God is between a man and a woman only. Also, we believe in receiving members into our fellowship that follow the natural dating relationship that leads to holy matrimony between a man and a woman only: thereby, preserving the family unit of father, mother and children. Ephesians 5:22,23 and 28, St. Mark 10:6,7,8 and Romans 1:26 and 27.
- **ARTICLE 16**. None of the above Articles shall be considered as to hold with particular election and reprobation so as to make God partial, directly or indirectly, nor to injure any of the children of men, nor shall any of those Articles be altered without legal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION

- **ARTICLE 1**. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.
- **ARTICLE 2**. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.
- **ARTICLE 3**. Only one member shall speak at a time who shall arise from his seat and obtain consent from the Moderator when he is about to make his speech.
- **ARTICLE 4**. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is through.
- **ARTICLE 5**. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on the person who has spoken so as make remarks on his slips or imperfections, but shall fairly state the cause as nearly as he can so as to convey his ideas.
- **ARTICLE 6**. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association.
- **ARTICLE** 7. No person shall speak more than three times on any subject without leave of the Association, and only five minutes at a time.
- **ARTICLE 8**. No person shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of public speech.
- **ARTICLE 9**. No member of the Association shall address another in any other term or appellation than that of "brother."
- **ARTICLE 10**. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit any member from speaking until he gives his light on any subject unless he violates the Rules of Decorum.
- **ARTICLE 11**. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.
- **ARTICLE 12**. The Moderator shall have the same right of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled; and he shall have no right to vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the deciding vote.
- **ARTICLE 13**. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of the Decorum shall be reproved by the Association as they think proper.
