FRIDAY September 9, 2022

The Sardis Association of Old Regular Baptist, the Church of Jesus Christ, assembled in the Business Room of the Sardis Association Building at l80 Brushy School Road, Varney, Pike County, Kentucky, with our host, the Turkey Creek Church and co-host Churches; Apple Orchard, Bent Branch, Pilgrims Home and Big Branch, on Friday before the second Saturday in September 2022. This year being the 25th anniversary of God's wonderful gift of a permanent site home, with the first meeting being held on Friday, September 12, 1997.

About the hour of 9:00 a.m., our Moderator, Elder Thomas J. Dials, came to the stand to an overflowing crowd and welcomed everyone, including the Brothers, Sisters, Friends and all in attendance. Brother Tommy spoke, saying we have been blessed another year to gather once again. These are three days of worship to glorify God. Many years ago, they started these old associations by realizing the importance of gathering together. God's salvation, which is in Jesus Christ, will take us home to Heaven, but sin, unrepented of, will take us to that bad place. We need to live in this world in a way that they can see the light and glorify the Father. He proceeded to read the prayer list of sick and afflicted, who are in need of God's healing power.

Elder Clyde Perry was chosen as the alternate for this session's Introductory Sermon. Having passed away and gone on to his eternal home, our tradition is that the moderator of the host church open the service. Elder Hobart Hamilton came to the stand to preach the opening of the service, saying he was surprised to be standing here. We came here because we love the Lord and each other. There is nothing greater on this earth than the love of God. Remember we are in the house of the Lord. I come to this place to tell you the whole world needs Jesus Christ. If we repent and serve him, he will forgive us of our sins and take us home to Heaven after this life is over. We worked for years following the wrong master. We clung to sinful ways for a long time. Years ago, God brought me down through my son's illness. God's people are willing to show love to others. God showed us mercy.

You may stray but you will never go over the line, if once you are forgiven. In that great day, the Lord will bring their souls back, the dust will come together again. We need to realize God has all power, and with that power he shows mercy. When I was down on my knees, I didn't know how to pray. The Lord will teach you how to pray if you desire to do so. I am willing to stand for the Lord whenever the occasion may arise.

He called for a song, as we sang "Salvation, O' The Name I Love."

Elder John Paul Hamilton, of the New Salem Association, then led in prayer.

Elder Charles Edwards, having been chosen last year, came to preach the Introductory Sermon. He came to the stand saying, I give God the glory and praise for being here today. I would ask you to pray for me, but I know that if you are brothers, you are praying already. God has been the best thing to come into my life. Jesus is the same yesterday, today, and forever more. Man thinks he can change God's word, but he cannot. God is leading and guiding this ole man. No matter how powerful you think you are, you know not how powerful God is. When Saul, called Paul, rode to Damascus to persecute the church, he felt the real power of God when he was stricken blind and brought to his knees. Blinded by the power of the light which shown round about him. That power of God came into me when I received forgiveness. God will baptize you with the Holy Ghost and with fire. Paul was without food or drink and without his sight for three days as he was led to Ananias, who taught him that he needed Jesus Christ as his Savior. Jesus is the way, the truth, and the life. We need to give God all the praise! Ananias was shown by God what was coming. He knew he had to go to Paul even though he had previously feared him. God had assured him Paul was now a praying man. When he met Paul, he called him brother.

Brother Charles continued, I was left on the streets of Columbus when I was twelve years old by my parents. A voice came to me and even though I wasn't brought up that way I knew who it was. I tried to compromise with God but that failed. Every time I went to do something wrong, that voice told me to not do it. At the age of eighteen, I met a wonderful lady from Pike County. I got married and had a nice family. As my life developed, I still worried about my parents. My dad hated me, if I came to see him, we would go out the back door until I left. I prayed for God to make him suffer so he would turn to God. One day at work my wife called me to tell me of my dad's repentance and forgiveness. I was also blessed to re-marry my mom and dad and then to baptize my dad. God walked with this little boy on the streets, then gave me my family, then God gave me my mom and dad back. God changes not, he is the same yesterday, today, and that forever more. The steps of a righteous man are ordered of the Lord. I just wanted to tell you all how God has blessed me. Looking back, I see God has been with me all my life. He that is in you is greater than he that is in the world. God gave me a dream, telling me I would be called to pray for a certain child and that he would heal her. The dream came to pass and as I arrived at the hospital to pray for her, the child died, was revived by the doctors, and then died again before they would let me in the room to pray. The frustrated doctor allowed me to pray and after following God's direction, the child lived and the parents brought her to church. God's the same yesterday, today, and forever more! God has blessed me and brought me to a place in my life where I had to make a choice. He wants you to come. Do what God is telling you to do. Come and taste of him and see that he is good.

He called for a song, we were blessed to sing, "There Is A Fountain Filled With Blood."

The Sardis Association delegates and a moderate delegation from our Corresponding Sister Associations remained in the Business Room for the Work of this Association, and as is our custom, the many non-delegate Brethren, Sisters and friends were dismissed to assemble in the Preaching Room to hear the preaching of:

The delegates having assembled themselves in order, Elder Thomas J. Dials, our Moderator, called to seats the delegates from our Churches sent to represent them in this Association and the delegates sent by our Corresponding Sister Associations. Brother Tommy called upon Elder Gary Estep of the Old Friendship Association to open the service.

Brother Gary fearfully came to the stand, trusting in God to remove that fear which was upon him. He was blessed to preach there is only one way to Heaven, that being through and by Jesus Christ. If you try to get there any other way you will be the same as a thief and a robber. God will not accept you that way. I had to get in a condition that God would receive me. I didn't have to do it by myself, God was there with me every step of the way. I've been down to the foot of Jesus, not naturally so, but through faith. If you love Jesus, you will keep his commandments. I don't need to carry around his book for he has written his commandments in my heart. How sweet it is to feel the presence of the Lord! What you have to offer is your whole heart, soul, mind, body and strength. The reason we have our orders written in our minutes is for those who try to sneak into our churches as wolves in sheep's clothing. We need to tell them the truth whether they hear or whether they forbear. Today is the day to get down to the foot of Jesus. Choose whom you will serve today. If it be God, let it be God, but if it be Baal, let it be Baal. Over in Heaven there will be peace, love, and joy. Come and go with me! We are in the evening of time. Don't tell our children any way is okay! Jesus Christ came and died on the cross and set up a new and living way. If you are in your sins and read the twenty-fourth chapter of Matthew you will God offered Solomon anything he would ask of get scared. This ole family is a great people. him. Solomon asked for wisdom to judge so great a people as Israel. Because Solomon choose wisely, God gave him that plus riches. Get ready, today is the day, tomorrow may be too late! The rich man didn't like Hell. He suffered then, suffers now, and will suffer forever. God's people are a peculiar people. Repent of your sins, be born again of God's divine love, and serve Jesus. God will give you increase. Brother Gary called for a song.

Elder Estill Hamilton, of the Union Association, then led in prayer.

- (7) The Moderator appointed the following Committee of Tellers to take the vote of the Sardis Association delegates for Officers to serve the Sardis Association for the coming year and instructed the delegates to vote for a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk:

(8) The Sardis Association then completed its 2022 organization by selecting the following Officers to serve for the coming year, and by regular move and second, the report of the Committee of Tellers was accepted, and the Committee was discharged:

- (16) By regular move and second the Clerks were given the authority to arrange the business for Saturday's session of the Sardis Association since no controversial Queries or Requests were received.
- (17) On motion from Brother Ron Hamilton, seconded by Brother Ernest Sesco, the Sardis Association was adjourned until 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning, September 10, 2022.

SATURDAY

September 10, 2022

Met pursuant to adjournment at the Sardis Association Building where, about the hour of 9:00 a.m., our Moderator, Elder Thomas J. Dials, came to the stand to welcome all, stating Jesus is on the right hand of the Father making intersession for us. If we all have the blood of Jesus Christ, we are family. We will not change from one thing to another. Nothing can remove us from that rock, Jesus Christ. I'm thankful we can come together in love. God has carried us through all our troubles. We will be changed and we are waiting on it. There is some suffering in it but the reward is worth it. Come together under him, I'm thankful. Sometimes I long for that cloud of glory. Get Jesus! He's the only thing that can take you home to glory.

He then called upon Elder Ralph Cloud, of the Old Indian Bottom Association, to open these Brother Ralph stated he was glad for God's mercy. God is able, his words are truth services. and life. He came to seek and save those who were lost. Without the shedding of blood there is no remission of sin. Hebrews 9:16, "For where a testament is, there must also of necessity be the death of the testator." We preach from the power from on high, the inspiration of the almighty. God can open that door and no man can shut it. Time and chance happen to them all. If Christ be lifted up above the earth, he will draw all men unto him. Jesus Christ was like a lamb, led down before his shearers. In his humiliation he opened not his mouth but suffered it all for all who would believe. STANDING ITEMS

Item 1. Item 14 of our 1975 Minutes is reprinted, without the preamble, as follows:

Sardis Association of Old Regular Baptist

September 13, 1975 Dingess, West Virginia

Brethren:

In answer to the Query from the Dix Fork Church asking, "Does the Sardis Association believe in Sisters wearing pants, slacks or shorts?" We, as an Advisory body, say:

To answer this query in the affirmative would be interpreted by some Brethren too liberally and they would say we have laid down the gate and opened the doors to anything and everything.

To answer this Query in the negative would be interpreted by some Brethren too strictly and they would say we have shut the door on everything and Committees would flow from Church to Church like water. We believe the Sardis Association should advise the Churches to advise their members, both Brethren and Sisters, to dress soberly and modestly and to conduct themselves in a manner that becometh a Child of God. We believe that each Child of God will adorn themselves in a manner that they can easily be identified from the world. We feel the Bible, the infallible Word of God, sets forth and the Spirit will teach us how we should dress and conduct ourselves.

We believe, and the Association has so stated in the past, that each Church in the Sardis Association holds the key to its own door and is the sole judge of the conduct of its members as long as they follow the orthodox principles of religion and keep up a Godly discipline according to the rules of the Gospel as laid down in the Scriptures. In fact, Article 3 of our Constitution guarantees that the Association shall not infringe on any internal right of the Churches.

- **Item 2.** The Association, by regular move and second, said that if a Sister has cut her hair, she should be asked to let it grow out; if she fails to do so and cuts her hair again, she will be excluded.

- **Item 5.** It is ordered that requests for Union, Communion and Memorial meetings be published in our Minutes.
- **Item 6.** By motion and second, it is ordered that Obituaries of our deceased Brethren and Sisters that are in good standing with the Churches at the time of death be printed in our Minutes. Also, friends of the Churches that are recommended by the Churches be printed in a separate section of our minute. These are to be presented to the Clerk at the end of the Association. A charge of \$15.00 will be made for a picture with the obituary, except that pictures of an Elder or his wife will continue to be printed free.

Clerks Notes on Item 6:

- ❖ Please note the above order it is incumbent upon the churches in the Sardis Association that they be the screen and recommending body of Obituaries of Friends to be printed in our minutes and identify the same (by note or otherwise) to the Clerks when the Obituary is turned in. Each Church Moderator is further required to screen and approve any Obituary of a Friend of the Church and to reject any Obituary that has language that is offensive to the Sardis Association.
- ❖ To expedite the processing of the Minutes, obituaries should be typed, please be sure the name of the deceased is written on the back of the picture and indicate if you want the picture returned. Include a self-addressed stamped envelope for returned pictures. You may also email your typed obituaries and pictures to Elder Michael Lowe throughout the year at the following email address: MDL448@HOTMAIL.COM, You would still need to send the \$15 payment for printing pictures.
- **Item 7**. "We the Sardis Association, advise our Sister Churches that it is not our practice to use sisters or double-married men in any function of the ministry, including leading prayer, in any of our Church services."
- Item 8. By regular move and second, it is ordered that Item (15) of our 1999 Minute be reprinted as follows: "It is a sin for anyone to put away their wife or husband for any cause except for fornication and marry another. In regards to going behind one's experience or receiving one in the Church with more than one living companion, we say that each Church shall be the sole judge to the validity of one's experience. Churches should not be forced to receive members, however, that would destroy the body. (Receive should be interpreted to include all means of receiving members.)"

SUNDAY

September 11, 2022

A heart felt spirit greatly filled the wonderful congregation gathered together as we lifted up God in song and praise as the Brothers, Sisters and Friends were blessed to meet at the Sardis Association building once again. I hope the same spirit that has been here all weekend, will be here today. You have to have a desire, there is a drawing power. That light shined to me, that light shines through these brothers and sisters. Jesus did for us what no one else could do. Jesus Christ came and offered himself a sacrifice. Jesus is the answer to our sins. Brother Tommy then read the prayer list and called upon Elder Sam Frye to come and introduce the service.

Elder Same Frye, of the Sardis Association, came saying, the Lord gave us the grace to get out of the bed this morning. Without that grace we have nothing. For the grace of God appeared to all men, teaching us that denying ungodliness and worldly lust, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world. Today is the day of salvation, not tomorrow. If you got Jesus, you are rich forever. Salvation will last forever. We all have problems and troubles, but the Lord made it possible for me to still be here today. His grace has brought us this far, and his grace will lead us home. What a beautiful congregation this morning. The Lord has always been there, he hasn't let me down yet.

He said I am the same yesterday, today and forever, I change not. If we are God's people, we change not. One Lord, one faith and one baptism. If the Lord don't save you, you're going down to a devil's hell. I don't want no one to go down to that place. You will be crying like the rich man, he is still crying for water today. People don't want to hear about Jesus. They took the Apostle Paul out and stoned him, threw him over the hill. They thought he was dead, but in a while he was back up preaching God. If you say no to God, you will send yourself down there. God is going to withdraw his spirit one day. I see tears coming from men and women's eyes, they hold back and don't do what God tells them to do. Since 1961, God gave me eternal life. We are still on our journey, we are going home one day. You are either in or you are out. If you get it you won't lose it. You are eternally sealed. The book says there are two ways, a wide gate and a broad road. Take the straight gate and narrow road and he will seal you. Jesus will lead you home. Man has to get in that old time way. God will lead you there, he will change your walk and your talk. You will be a brand new man, to live forever. When the Lord puts you on that path, you will walk straight. If you get Christ in you, you will be a good man. You are on your way home. If you haven't been born again, you will have to go down where the rich man is at. Hear his voice and harden not your heart. What are you going to do with him when he comes?

He called for a song, and we sang, "Salvation O' the Name I Love."

Elder Same Frye continued with a humble prayer.

Elder John Wayne White, of the Sardis Association, came to the stand saying, I am thankful to be here today and for what I feel today. The Lord spoke to the prophets one time and told them to keep the camps of Israel clean. *I will walk among you, and will be your God, and ye shall be my people.* We know if we preach, we know the Word has to be preached. The Lord commanded us to preach the Word. Today they twist the word to suit their own ways. The spirit in man, the inspiration of the almighty will teach them to understand.

Speaking of the foundation, it was laid among the apostles and prophets with Jesus Christ, the chief cornerstone. Down in the old book you can read about Jesus Christ. It is the foundation, God told Abraham to get up and move out. Abraham believed God, and God imputed to him for righteousness. This one says there is no faith out in the world. Abraham believed God, thirty years after Isaac was born. God told him to take his son on the mountain and offer him up to God. Abraham believed him because God had already told him in Isaac thy seed will be blessed. He told his servants, the lad and I will return, because he believed God. Abraham made the alter and gathered the wood. The lad asked, where was the sacrifice. God will provide. Abraham would have taken his life, but the angel told him to do the lad no harm. God told Abraham thirty years later, now I know thou heart is with me. The Lord won't have you like you are. God requires some work on our part. The Word says work out your own salvation. I worked it out in 1977, working it out with fear and trembling.

The old church has been around a long time. Go back and read a little, God's ministers need to study to show thyself approved. We need to get down in the Word of God, we need the Word to fight against the world. This church will be here until Jesus Christ returns. We can read about the old church in the wilderness. Jesus Christ was with that church. Jacob had a vision, and on his way he made a pillow out of a stone. In the dream he saw a ladder into Heaven. He saw angels ascending and descending up and down. This was the first stone in the foundation of this church. Paul said the church is the house of God. People might think I only need God, I don't have to belong to the church. Jesus Christ is coming back for the old church. He made Abraham a promise, through thy seed all nations will be blessed. In Christ all the earth will be blessed in his seed, as we are the generation of Jesus Christ. It all goes back to Abraham, God knew what he was doing when he made this old time way. He told Noah he would no longer curse the earth for man's sake. Man's imagination is evil from his youth. God said I made man and I know what is in him.

God drove Adam from the garden. We got to get back to the tree of life, it is something you got to do. It's not of works. The scripture says there are two roads, a broad road to destruction. All men and women in this world are traveling that road. It leads to destruction. Some are on the narrow path, we seek God and his love to get to know Jesus Christ. Once I went through the gate, I received salvation of my soul. He that taketh hold of the plow and look back is not worthy of the Kingdom of God. I ate a little bread when I was out in the field. God is not slack concerning his promise. Nothing can give life today except God, when he made man he breathed

the breath of life into him and he became a living soul. The bones said our hope is gone, we have no hope. God told Ezekiel, tell them when I go down into the grave, I the Lord thy God has performed it. They got hope when Jesus Christ arose from the dead.

In the book of Revelation it says, I saw the souls of those that were beheaded, as they cried out oh Lord how long to avenge our blood. When Jesus Christ arose, his blood covered it all, some to the hinder sea, some to the former sea, and they were given white robes. We were stained with sin, the writer said I saw those that came through the great tribulation, washed white in the blood of the Lamb. The Lord applied the blood for the washing of sins. Listen to God's ways, if we will walk in his way, he will be there. God said lift your eyes toward the hills and you will know your redemption draws nigh. On that resurrection day we are going to win the war. Once we are changed we will go home to live with him forever.

Elder Richard Staton, our Assistant Moderator, came to the stand and stated, there's nothing in this world like the blessing of the Lord. Jesus left his father's house and took on a body of flesh so that he could taste death for all mankind. I'm going to a place where I won't have to worry about the things of this world. I believe that we have heard the gospel preached today. If you take heed to that gospel it will save your soul. I feel the least among you today. Jesus said go and open your mouth and I'll fill it. In that morning of all mornings, he'll say get up little children I've got a better place for you. If you miss Heaven you won't miss it all, you've just missed the good part. Jesus is the chief corner stone. I got in trouble on account of my sins. I prayed and I know he was listening. I prayed and I felt a witness. He's got a home in Heaven for everyone that wants it. If you haven't got something you can feel, you better get rid of it and get something you can feel down on the inside. There's a time for all things. A time to live and a time to die. A time to kill and a time to heal. A time to cast down stones and a time to pile up stones. He'll write your name in the lamb's book of life and no one can blot it out. I can remember when I was a boy playing out in the hills. I could hear my mother calling us to supper time. I thought that natural food was so good, but now I'm eating from mother Jerusalem's table. All the days of my appointed time will I wait, till my change comes. I'm seeking a city whose builder and maker is God. Jesus asked Peter, lovest thou me Peter? And Peter said, yay Lord, thou knowest. Jesus said, many honor me with their lips but their hearts are far from me. He asked him again, lovest thou me Peter? He said, if you love me, feed my sheep. If you want some good food, Jesus has it for you today. He said I'm the bread that comes down from God out of Heaven that a man may eat thereof and never die. When I get over there, I'm going to give him the honor and praise that he so richly deserves. Jesus said I'll never leave you and I'll never forsake you. I'll go with all the way to the end of the Earth. God has got a place prepared for those that love and serve him. By grace are you saved through faith, not of works lest any man should boast. After God has saved you, he'll have you go tell your friends the good things the Lord has done for you. You have to repent, you have to believe and you have to be baptized. That water won't save you, it answers a good conscious towards God. It's that fire and Holy Ghost baptism that does the saving. God's got children all over this world. I don't know everything but I know my experience. I'm willing to die on that experience. This old outward man is going to perish but there's a man on the inside that is renewed day by day.

Elder Thomas J. Dials, our Moderator, came to the stand to close out the service saying, I am very thankful for the way things have been this weekend. The Lord is precious to me. John 3:16, "God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." He gave us a way to get out of our sins. There's only one way to get back and that's through the blood of Jesus Christ. We loved the things of this world. We need to realize that God is the source of salvation. We need to move toward him and if we aren't moving toward him, we are moving toward the devil. In order to get to the cross, I had to lay down the things that I had picked up that were contrary to the ways of the Lord. Under the law, that natural blood didn't make anything right. It didn't give them everlasting salvation, it only saved them for a short time. He puts his laws in our minds and writes them in our hearts. When he does, he'll show us where we need to go and where we need to stay. He laid in Zion for a foundation a stone, a tried stone, a precious corner stone, a sure foundation. There appeared a wonder in Heaven. A woman clothed with the sun and the moon in under her feet, travailing in birth to be delivered. And she brought forth a man child. There's only one we can give our troubles to. He'll give us a witness that he is on the right hand of the Father making intercession. And there appeared another wonder in Heaven, a great red dragon and his tail drew the third part of the stars. In the garden, God gave them everything they needed but the old devil came in the form of a serpent. He brought in the first false doctrine we can read of. God had given them a commandment. 
and Son Funeral Home of Pikeville, Roberts Funeral Home at Robinson Creek, and at last the Community Funeral Home at Zebulon.


BRIAN "KEITH" CLINE

understanding of them. Dad taught me a lot growing up as I look back on my life, under his guidance.



CONSTITUTION OF THE

SARDIS SSOCIATION

From a long series of experiences, we, the OLD REGULAR BAPTIST CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST, being baptized upon a profession of faith in Christ are convinced of the necessity of a combination of Churches in order to perpetuate a union and communion among us and to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following plan of government.

- **ARTICLE 1.** The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different Churches in our union and sent to represent them in the Association and, upon their producing Letters from their respective Churches certifying their appointment, they shall be entitled to a seat.
- **ARTICLE 2**. In the Letters shall be expressed their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by Letter, dismissed, excluded, and deceased since our last Association.
- **ARTICLE 3**. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord anything over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical power over the Churches nor shall they infringe on any of the internal rights of any Church in the Union.
- ARTICLE 4. The Association when convened shall be ruled by a regular and proper decorum.
- **ARTICLE 5**. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.
- **ARTICLE 6**. New Churches may be admitted to this union who shall petition by Letter and delegates and, if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received; and every Church in the union shall be entitled to a representative in the Association.
- **ARTICLE 7**. Every query presented by the Church to the Association, being first debated in their own Churches, shall be taken up by the Association.
- **ARTICLE 8**. Every motion made and seconded shall come under consideration of the Association, except when withdrawn by the one who made it.
- **ARTICLE 9**. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the Churches with Minutes of the Association.
- **ARTICLE 10**. We think it necessary that we should have an Association Fund for defraying the expenses of the same. We think it the duty of each Church in the union to contribute such sums as they think proper and to send it by their delegates to the Association; and such sums be deposited in the hands of the Treasurer chosen by the Association who shall be accountable for the money paid him by the Association, and paid out according to the Association.
- **ARTICLE 11**. There shall be an Association book kept wherein the proceedings of every Association shall be recorded by a Secretary appointed by the Association who shall receive a compensation for his services.
- **ARTICLE 12**. The minutes of the Association shall be read, and corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk before the Association rises, unless the same is dispensed with.
- **ARTICLE 13**. Amendments to this plan or form of government may be made by a majority of the union, if deemed necessary.
- **ARTICLE 14**. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by the will of the majority of the delegates present.

ARTICLE 15. The Association shall have the power to provide for the general union of the Churches; to preserve inviolable a chain of communion among the Churches; to give Churches all necessary advice in matters of difficulty; to inquire into the cause of the Churches failing to represent themselves at any time in the Association; to appropriate the money contributed by the Churches for the Association fund to any purpose they may think proper; to appoint any member, by their consent, to transact any business which they see necessary; and they shall have the power to withdraw from any Church in the union which violates the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion; and to admit any orderly Minister of our order to seat with us. The Association shall have the right to adjourn themselves to any future time or place they may think most convenient to the Churches.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION

- **ARTICLE 1**. We believe in only one true and living God; the Father, the Son and Holy Ghost; and these three are one, equal in power, essence and glory.
- **ARTICLE 2**. We believe the scripture of the Old and New Testaments of the Authorized King James Version of the Bible are the written words of God and are the only rules of faith and practice.
- ARTICLE 3. We believe in the doctrine of election by grace, for by grace are ye saved through faith.
- **ARTICLE 4**. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and of man's inability to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, therefore the Savior is needed for our redemption.
- **ARTICLE 5**. We believe that sinners are called to repentance and believe in the Gospel and regeneration of the soul and sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise, and none shall fall away and be lost.
- **ARTICLE 6**. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.
- **ARTICLE 7**. We believe that baptism is the ordinance of God's Church on earth and the mode IMMERSION, back foremost, so as to cover all over.
- **ARTICLE 8**. We believe that the Lord's Supper is the command of the Savior, and that by use of bread and the fruit of the vine, and feet washing should be kept up until his second coming by his believers.
- **ARTICLE 9**. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, both of the just and the unjust, and that the joys of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked shall be eternal.
- **ARTICLE 10**. We believe that no Minister has the right to administer the ordinances and commands of the Gospel except such as are regularly baptized by immersion of a legal administrator of the Gospel and ordained coming under the hands of a regularly chosen presbytery of the Church.
- **ARTICLE 11**. We believe it to be the duty of all Church members to contribute for defraying all reasonable expenses of the Church, never forgetting the poor according to their several abilities.
- **ARTICLE 12**. We believe that every doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge people in their sins or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving faith in Christ for salvation is erroneous, and such doctrine shall be rejected by us.
- **ARTICLE 13**. We believe that the Church of Jesus Christ is a congregation of faithful believers in Christ who have obtained fellowship with the Lord and one another and have given themselves to the Lord and have agreed to keep up a Godly discipline according to the rules of the Gospel.
- **ARTICLE 14**. We believe that Jesus Christ is the head of the Church and the government thereof is upon His Shoulders.

ARTICLE 15. We believe that a sanctioned marriage of God is between a man and a woman only. Also, we believe in receiving members into our fellowship that follow the natural dating relationship that leads to holy matrimony between a man and a woman only: thereby, preserving the family unit of father, mother and children. Ephesians 5:22,23 and 28, St. Mark 10:6,7,8 and Romans 1:26 and 27.

ARTICLE 16. None of the above Articles shall be considered as to hold with particular election and reprobation so as to make God partial, directly or indirectly, nor to injure any of the children of men, nor shall any of those Articles be altered without legal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM OF THE SARDIS ASSOCIATION

- ARTICLE 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.
- **ARTICLE 2**. The Association shall have a Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk each chosen separately by a majority vote of the delegates present.
- **ARTICLE 3**. Only one member shall speak at a time who shall arise from his seat and obtain consent from the Moderator when he is about to make his speech.
- **ARTICLE 4**. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is through.
- **ARTICLE 5**. He shall strictly adhere to the subject and in no wise reflect on the person who has spoken so as make remarks on his slips or imperfections, but shall fairly state the cause as nearly as he can so as to convey his ideas.
- **ARTICLE 6**. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the Association.
- **ARTICLE 7**. No person shall speak more than three times on any subject without leave of the Association, and only five minutes at a time.
- **ARTICLE 8**. No person shall have the liberty of laughing during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of public speech.
- **ARTICLE 9**. No member of the Association shall address another in any other term or appellation than that of "brother."
- **ARTICLE 10**. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit any member from speaking until he gives his light on any subject unless he violates the Rules of Decorum.
- **ARTICLE 11**. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk and called as often as the Association requires.
- **ARTICLE 12**. The Moderator shall have the same right of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled; and he shall have no right to vote unless the Association be equally divided, then he may give the deciding vote.
- **ARTICLE 13**. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of the Decorum shall be reproved by the Association as they think proper.
